Cobalt and Haileybury last week.

Haileybury had an unusually good record in the matter of fires last year the fire chief's report submitted to the Haileybury council some days ago showing that in 1927 the town had only 15 fires, the total damage being \$1,072.00. There were only 30 fire alarms turned in during the year.

Of this sum two companies, Hollinger and Consolidated Smelters, distributed \$12,750,862.50, while several other companies paid out considerably more than a million each."

Illustration of the wide use of the airplane in prospecting and mining work in the North of Canada is given by the fact that recently airplanes were used by prospetors staking Favourable Lake, over 200 miles north of Hudson, Ont., while at the same time other prospectors used airplanes to go prospecting at Reindeer Lake, 800 miles northwest of Winnipeg, where rich finds of copper, zinc and lead were reported.
