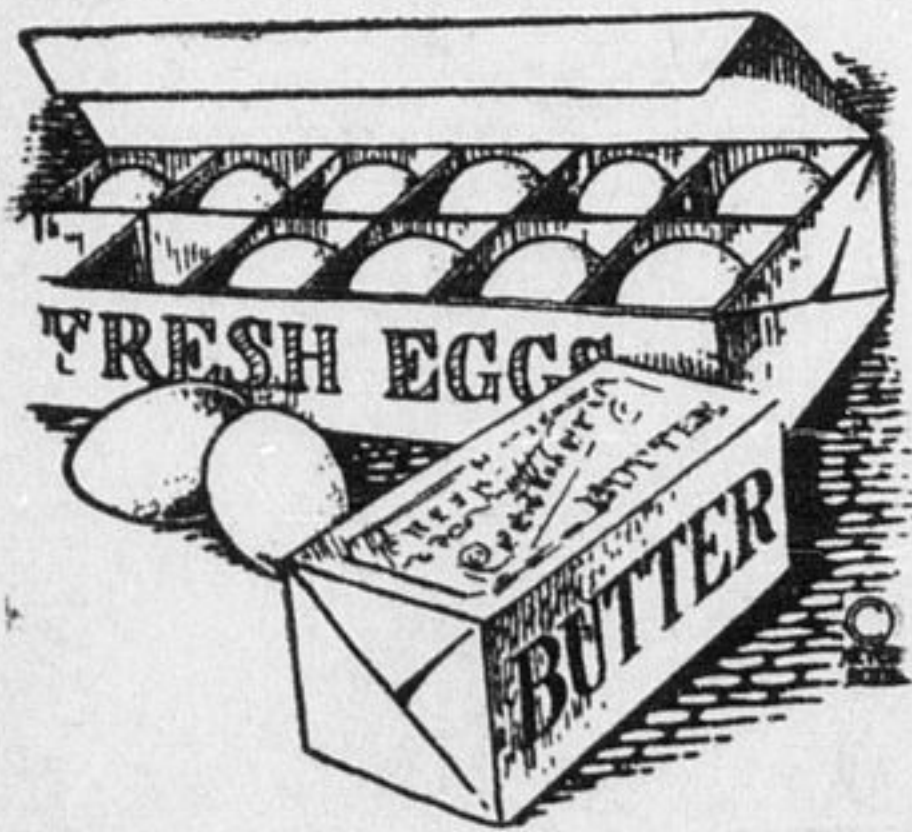

On two games South Porcupine was twelve points up and as competition for this trophy ceases on March 31st for the year, there will be no more challenges until another season has come. We wish our merry men of the stane and besom as good luck next year as they have had in this for they have been successful in keeping this much-prized trophy within their own precincts the greater part of the past season. TIMMINS FUND TO BE USED FOR THE BUYING OF BOOKS

Some weeks ago The Advance referred to a fund raised at Rouyn to aid any sufferers from the Hollinger disaster. The fund was raised by a theatre performance at Rouyn and about \$200.00 was realized. Nothing further was heard by The Advance in regard to the disposition of the fund until this week when The Rouyn News came along with this news item:—"Children of poor families who are without books to attend school have some hope held out to them through the action of council at their regular meeting last Tuesday. "The fund which was collected through a benefit performance at the Regal Theatre some time ago for the benefit of the sufferers of the Hollinger Mine disaster has been refused by that company, as have many similar funds, due to the anxiety of the company to take care of their own. "Mayor Charlebois, as treasurer of the fund, made the suggestion that the money be applied to local charities and asked for suggestions. The sense of the meeting seemed to be that there were many children in Rouyn who were unable to attend school due to the fact that they were unable to buy the necessary books and that this purpose was the ideal one for which to use the money. "A vote to that effect was passed and Mayor Charlebois and Walter McLoon, editor of the Rouyn News were appointed to administer the fund. Due to the misguided efforts of one of the aldermen, who did all in his power to hinder the collection of the Hollinger Fund and to hurt the benefit for which the Regal theatre so kindly gave their entire organization, the amount is a very small one, but it is sufficient to help out many poor families. "A strict system of investigation has been organized and every case will be personally looked into by the Mayor and Mr. McLoon before any assistance is given. Applications for this aid may be made to any alderman, the Mayor or Mr. McLoon. Hubby had fallen down the stairs and his wife anxiously bending over him. "Oh, Tom, did you miss a step?" BEING A BY-LAW TO AUTHORISE THE EXECUTION OF AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TEMISKAMING TELEPHONE COMPANY, LIMITED, AND THE TOWN OF TIMMINS.

WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Timmins deem it to be in the interests of the Corporation, and of the residents thereof, and to be advisable to enter into an agreement with The Temiskaming Telephone Company, Limited.

Now therefore the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Timmins enacts as follows:—

1. That the proper officers of the said municipality shall on the assent thereto of The Municipal Electors of the Municipal Corporation, first had and obtained, enter into an agreement on behalf of the Municipality with The Temiskaming Telephone Company, Limited, for telephone service within the Municipality of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins, which agreement shall be in the words and figures, and shall contain the terms and conditions and shall be for a period as follows:

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made this day of A.D. 1928

BETWEEN— THE TEMISKAMING TELEPHONE COMPANY, LIMITED, hereinafter called the "Company"

OF THE FIRST PART and THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF TIMMINS hereinafter called the "Town."

OF THE SECOND PART.

1. WITNESSETH that the Company in consideration of the covenant herein contained is hereby authorized and permitted and the Town hereby grants to the company the right to use the highways, squares, lanes and other public places in the said Town for placing in, upon, over and under the same, poles, cables, ducts, and wires for the purpose of its business, provided the opening up of any such highway, square, lane or other public place, for the erection of poles or for carrying wires underground, shall be under the direction and supervision of the Town Council, or such officer or agent as the said Council may appoint, and that the surface of such highway, square, or other public place shall in all cases be restored to its former condition and at the expense of the Company.

2. The Company shall indemnify and save harmless, the Town, its officers and servants, from all manner of loss, damage, injuries, suits, claims and damages on account of the said Telephone System either in the erection or operation thereof.

3. The Company shall not remove, cut or trim any shade tree, within the limits of the Town without the consent of the Town Council and shall be responsible for all damage through such removal, cutting or trimming.

4. The Company shall maintain an all-night Telephone service in connection with its Exchange in the said Town, and shall operate and maintain its system in accordance with such of the provisions of the Ontario Telephone Act and amendments thereto, as apply to it.

5. This agreement shall extend to a period of Ten years from the first day of 1928, and during the period of Five years the Town agrees that it will not give to any person, firm or company, any right, license or permission to use the highways, square or public places or any of them within the limits of the Town for the purpose of placing in or upon, over or under, such highways, squares or public places or any of them or any part thereof or of any of them, any poles, ducts or wires, for the purpose of carrying on a telephone business.

6. The said Company shall not during the term of Ten years, without the permission of the said Town to be expressed by By-law, charge any greater rates for supplying telephone service of the description hereinafter mentioned, than as follows:

- Business Individual Line Service—Wall telephone—\$50.00 per annum. Two Party Line Service—Wall telephone—\$47.50 per annum. Three Party Line Service—Wall telephone—\$45.00 per annum. Residence Individual Line Service—Wall telephone—\$31.25 per annum. Two Party Line Service—Wall telephone—\$27.50 per annum. Three or Four Party Line Service—Wall telephone—\$25.00 per annum. Mine Service within 1/2 mile from Central—Wall telephone—\$125.00 per annum. For each quarter mile beyond the first half mile \$7.50 per annum. Mine Extension—Wall telephone—\$50.00 per annum. P. B. E. Equipment per connection \$12.50 per annum. Additional charge for Desk telephone in lieu of Wall telephone—\$6.25 per annum. Extension Wall telephone on same premises, residence—\$12.50 per annum. Extension Wall telephone on same premises—\$18.75 per annum. Extension Desk telephone on same premises—Business \$25.00 per annum—Residence. For an Extension Bell—\$2.50 (small) \$5.00 (large).

Keys—\$12.50 per annum. Moving charge to new address—\$5.00 Change of location in same building \$2.50.

The above rates subject to a discount of Twenty per cent (20%) if account is paid within 30 days of rendering of same. Toll charge between Timmins and South Porcupine exchanges and vice-versa is 10c. (Ten Cents) for each conversation of three minutes duration. For Overtime—2c. per minute.

The Company further agrees that all calls made by subscribers between Timmins and Schumacher and vice-versa, shall be free and that Mines' telephones shall be exempt from all tolls originating at Mines between Timmins and South Porcupine.

Payment for telephone service and other special equipment as outlined above to be made half-yearly in advance, and payment for toll charges over the Company's and its connecting lines, to be made upon delivery of bill therefor.

7. The Company shall during the period of this agreement, maintain its telephone system in at least as good and efficient condition as it is at the present time and shall make such additions and improvements thereto as the requirements of the Town may demand.

8. It is agreed that the Town is to have the privilege of using the top gain on every pole without charge, for use of fire alarm and police patrol wires.

9. On and after September 1st, 1928 the Company agrees to install telephones within one week from date of ordering of same, the applicant to have option of single or party line service.

10. Wherever in this agreement the word "Company" is used, the same shall extend to and include the Party of the First Part, its successors and assigns, and wherever in this agreement the word "Town" is used, the same shall mean the Party of the Second Part and shall extend to and include its successors and assigns.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the said parties have hereunto and hereto affixed their respective corporate seals under the hands of their respective proper officers. SIGNED, SEALED AND DELIVERED in the presence of

On the 9th day of April, 1928, at the hour of Ten o'clock in the forenoon, the head of the Council of the said Corporation or some member of the said Council appointed for that purpose by resolution, shall attend at the Town Office in the said Town of Timmins, for the purpose of appointing and if requested so to do, shall appoint by writing signed by him Two (2) persons to attend at the final summing up of the Votes by the Clerk, and One (1) person to attend at the Polling places on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the proposed By-law, and One (1) person on behalf of the persons interested in and opposing the proposed By-law.

This By-law will be taken into consideration by the Council of the Town of Timmins, in meeting at the Town Hall, Timmins, on the 30th day of April, 1928.
