Proposes Plan for Planting Trees Around Temiskaming

President of Agricultural Society at New Liskeard Suggests Tree Planting Day and the Honouring of Pioneers of the North by Planting Trees Named for Them.

During the past few weeks The Advance has been giving particular space to matters regarding trees and forestry. This has been due not only to the general interest all the year round in this district in such matters, but also because of the fact that this month "Forest Week" is being held in an effort by the Dominion and Provincial Governments to increase the public interest in forestry matters. Another reason for the recent special attention given to forestry matters was the interest aroused by the proposal of the Kiwanees to plant trees throughout the town of Timmins this summer. It is recognized by all thoughtful people that for beauty and for shade, trees are very necessary in the Northern communities. The methods of clearing land up here mean that towns and villages are usually left without any trees at all, while very few are left on the farms being cleared. To right the situation thus created, there is only one thing to do,—to plant trees. Mr. Wes. McKnight, president of the New Liskeard Agricultural Society, has taken up the question of tree-planting in his usual thorough manner, and the following letter which he has written on the subject should be read with very general interest:—

Mr. McKnight's Letter

Forty years ago this Spring father and I planted a row of maple trees on the old homestead along the lane from the house to the road. There would be about thirty trees in all. Well I remember father telling me that in fifteen or twenty years they would be fine large shade trees. That seemed a long time to wait. Year after year I watched them grow, and ten years later when we decided to sell the old farm and move to Temiskaming those trees had grown to a considerable size and were greatly admired by the family as well as the passers-by.

Another ten years went by and when I went back to see the old "homestead" what do you think the present owner said to me? Not that we had filled the fence corners with stones, or kept the fields clean from weeds, but that the planting of that row of maple trees was the finest thing we had done on the old farm. That remark and the fact that I was fortunate or unfortunate enough to be chosen as President of our Agricultural Society for this year has prompted me to suggest "A tree planting day in Temiskaming."

The fires which swept this district in the early days left very few trees and as you drive by the farmers' homes to-day it seems to be the one thing needful. True, there are some of our farmers who are beautifying their homes by planting trees and

right here let me pay tribute to their thoughtfulness. Their children and their children's children will rise up and call them blessed.

The Plan

May I suggest that the plan be carried out by townships and to include the townships of Dymond, Bucke, Harris, Hudson, Kerns, Harley, Casey, Brethour and Hilliard and that the Reeves who are respectively: N. Wickett, W. J. Post, George Smith, Jas. Richardson, Herb. Jibb, Wm. Goddard, Joe Sheedy, John Armstrong and W. Ward, take the matter in hand in their respective townships, locate as soon as possible where native trees can be had for the digging, then notify the different farmers in the township, so that when the proper time comes for planting no time may be lost.

Public Holiday

The Horticultural Society in New Liskeard are arranging for a tree planting day in the town. We expect the Mayor to declare a holiday and our aim is to plant one thousand trees. The day will be selected a little later in the season but in plenty of time to make all necessary arrangements.

Why not declare a holiday in the schools in the townships for the same

day and plant trees around the school yard, the churchyard, the cemetery; but by all means plant trees around your homes and along the roadways. Plant a tree in honour of your reeve, another in honour of the late John Armstrong, the first reeve in Temiskaming; another in honour of Capt. Tom Magladery, ex. M.P.P., another in honour of A. J. Kennedy, M.P.P., another in honour of Mack Lang, M.P., another in honour of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Hon. Mackenzie King and another in honour of E. F. Stephenson, our pioneer Editor of the "Speaker"—and by all means plant one in honour of "Mother"—yes, and another for "Dear old Dad."

The Kind of Trees and How to Plant Them.

This is too important a question for me to answer but I will try to have some one who knows, answer this question in next week's "Speaker." Literature can also be had from the Dept. of Agriculture. I would also advise calling public meetings in the different localities to talk it over. In other words, "Plan your work, then work your plan."

How Many Trees Will You Plant?

I am going to suggest that each farmer make a report of how many trees have been planted on his farm during the week in which the special day has been set aside; also the kind of trees planted, and that he send in a certified copy to the Reeve of his township to be kept on file.

The Banner Township.

I will donate a fifteen foot Canadian flag to the Agricultural Society to be presented to the reeve of the Township planting the most trees during the week above mentioned, the presentation to be made at New Liskeard Beach during our Fall fair and if possible have the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. John S. Martin, make the presentation—the flag to be won two years in succession before becoming the property of the township.

Now then let the citizens of these nine townships and as many others as will enter into it, get busy, Boost! Boost! Boost! Plant trees, then watch them grow.

MINING WILL MAKE THIS COUNTRY PROSPEROUS

Canada Now Just Entering Its Own Particular "Metal Age." With Bright Prospects.

Under the heading "Canada Entering the Metal Age," The Canadian Mining World, published by Stobie, Forlong & Co., editorially makes some interesting comments on the mining industry, and point out that it is entering on the most prosperous era. The editorial follows:

"Canada is just entering her own particular metal age, and developments of the next few years will equal those of any other country of history. From Atlantic to Pacific, Canadians are mine-conscious as never before, and the tremendous activity everywhere must lead to many great and small producing mines in every direction. The new Dominion of Newfoundland, too, has joined the movement, and developments already assure at least one great complex mine, sponsored by the largest mining corporation in the world. That other big ore bodies will be found seems

very certain and in that event Newfoundland will occupy a particularly strategic position in relation to the markets of Europe, as her main ports are nearer the other side than New York, for instance, by a quarter of the distance.

"Now and then we hear of so-called leading financiers deprecating the wide-spread spirit of mine speculation throughout the Dominion, although, we are glad to say, Government officials and many bankers ascribe that spirit to awakened consciousness of Canadians in the immense possibilities in the latent metal resources of their country. Naturally, some will lose money in unsuccessful mining efforts; but, nevertheless, the result, figured in a national way, will be of tremendous benefit. Mining capital for out-of-the-way districts can never be raised in a wholesale way except in periods of intense speculation, and that is the case of the public purse-strings for metal-mining operations in every Province of the Dominion means great prosperity for the nation, as here and there great and small mines add their creations of new wealth to the public purse. Discrimination between the bad and the good, and possibly good, is the great need at such times, and it is to be hoped that efforts of Government officials and financiers will be along those lines, and those only. Any effort to squelch the speculative spirit that is prying the lid off the best metal pot on earth will not be to Canada's advantage. She is just entering the metal age—the most prosperous era of her entire history."
