Annual Meeting of Northern Ontario Football Association

Reports of Officers Show Successful Season for 1927. Still Better Hoped for in 1928. Mr. W. A. Field the New President of the N.O.F.A. Other Business Dealt With.

The Northern Ontario Football Association held their annual general meeting in the town hall last Saturday evening for the purpose of receiving the 1927 reports and the election of the officers for the season just commencing. President Laidlaw was in the chair and all affiliated bodies were represented with the exception of the Kirkland Local Football League and the Timmins Thistles Football Club. Vice-president Hastie, of Kirkland Lake was the only officer unable to attend.

President Laidlaw, in his address, reviewed the football situation in 1927 and made suggestions for the future. He also expressed his opinion that Northern Ontario football showed signs of a vigorous revival and he expected to see better sport this year than in 1927.

The secretary-treasurer, W. H. Wilson, submitted the financial statement for the 1927 season, showing a credit balance of \$73.85, after paying the O.F.A. affiliation fee for 1928, and also the cost of registration forms and other supplies for this year. The report was adopted.

The secretary was instructed by motion to write a letter of condolence to Mrs. C. E. Richards. The late Mr.

Chas. E. Richards was a member of the N.O.F.A. Council, and was highly regarded in football circles as a clean sportsman and enthusiast.

Mr. Laidlaw informed the delegates that he had decided to retire from the presidency, as he had held the position for quite a number of years, and owing to business arrangements he would not be able to devote the required time to the work of that office.

Messrs W. A. Field and Morris Hastie were nominated for president, the former winning by a slight majority.

The vice-presidents, secretary-treasurer and O.F.A. Councillor were re-elected by acclamation, these being as follows:—first vice-president, Morris Hastie, Kirkland Lake; second vice-president, Andy Roberts, senior, Timmins; secretary-treasurer, W. H. Wilson, Timmins; O.F.A. Councillor, W. A. Field, Timmins.

The honorary officers for 1927 were re-elected by acclamation:—

Hon. president—John Knox, Timmins.

Hon. vice-presidents—E. L. Longmore, Timmins; Harry Oakes, Kirkland Lake; E. B. Knapp, Kirkland Lake; J. E. Patterson, Iroquois Falls; C. V. Gallagher, South Porcupine.

Mr. Field read the report of the D. F. A. concerning the International game on July 1st last year between the Scottish team and the Northern Ontario team, and it showed that while the attendance had been disappointing compared to the previous International game here it showed a satisfactory balance on the right side of the ledger.

It was decided that all leagues and clubs desiring to affiliate with the N. O. F. A. for the 1928 season must have their applications and fees in the hands of the secretary not later than May 15th. The fees for a league are \$25.00 and for a club \$10.00. Players' registration forms are now on hand and the 1928 constitutions of the D. F. A. and the O.F.A. are expected this week. These will be obtainable from the secretary at a cost of 25c. each, while the charge for registrations is the same as last year.

All leagues and clubs were requested to appoint their official representatives to the Council of the N.O.F.A. and to notify the secretary of the name and postal address of such representative.

On motion it was decided to retain the very valuable services of Mr. H. G. Laidlaw on the executive by adding the past president to that body. Mr. Laidlaw will accordingly as past president, and so ex officio a member of the executive, continue to be looked to for advice and assistance by the N.O.F.A.

BY-LAW No. 372 of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Timmins

A By-Law to provide for taking the votes of the electors on a proposed By-Law entitled "A By-Law to authorize the execution of an agreement between The Temiskaming Telephone Company, Limited, and the Town of Timmins."

WHEREAS a proposed By-law of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins entitled "A By-Law to authorize the execution of an agreement between The Temiskaming Telephone Company, Limited, and the Town of Timmins," requires for its validity the assent of the electors and it is expedient and necessary to pass this By-Law for the purpose of enabling the electors to vote on the proposed By-Law.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins, as follows:

1. The votes of the electors of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins, shall be taken on the said proposed By-Law on the 27th day of April A.D. 1928, between the hours of Nine o'clock in the forenoon and Five o'clock in the afternoon at the following places.

3. On the 30th day of April A.D. 1928, at the hour of Four (4) o'clock in the afternoon at the Town Hall in the said Municipality, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-Law.
