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## Man Crushed By Tractor Dies at South Porcupine Hospital

Deep Regret at Death of Werner Isaacson. Floods Cause Inconvenience at South Porcupine. Scout News Items. Other Interesting News from South Porcupine Correspondent.

It was with regret that the district learned of the death of Werner Isaacson at the Porcupine hospital on Friday, April 13th. On Saturday, April 7th, this young man had fallen and his skull had been fractured by his own tractor which ran over him. But he seemed to be improving and was beginning to talk of when he could go home, when on Wednesday he took a turn for the worse and meningitis set in. His young wife, who is without relatives of her own in this country, is heart-broken. There is also a little six-year-old son, who has been left delicate by an attack of infantile paralysis, who will sadly miss the fond protection of his father. The late Mr. Isaacson was a fine type of citizen, esteemed alike by his own countrymen and those of his adopted home. He was a successful farmer and pulpwood contractor, hard-working and industrious, and just a year or so ago had erected a fine comfortable home overlooking the lake on his farm at Pottsville. His father and another brother also reside in this part of the camp. Another brother is a resident of United States and the funeral is being delayed until he can reach here. It will leave the Finn hall, South Porcupine, at one o'clock on Sunday next.

They left the Flin Flon Mine where Mr. Parnell has a responsible position, over a month ago and have visited Winnipeg, Chicago, Detroit, Port Colborne before coming on to Porcupine. 
