Mr. H. A. Preston Receives Interesting Letter from Wayne, Michigan

Mr. H. A. Preston is tireless in his writing to explain the possibilities of this North Land and to extol the attractions of this country to those who love nature, the woods, the streams and the game life. Recently, Mr. Preston wrote some articles for United States sporting journals, and as a result a couple in Wayne, Mich. wrote him. The letter was addressed to "Matheson, Ont., Can., Watchman at Mine, 14 Miles from Matheson." But it eventually was forwarded to Schumacher, after a try at Elk Lake. The letter will no doubt be of interest to many here, and so is given below in full, with the exception, of course, of the name:—

Dear Mr. Preston:—On behalf of my husband who is a dyed-in-the-wool sportsman, and having read your very interesting article in one of the sports magazines, I'm going to see if this letter reaches you and if you will be kind enough to reply.

We feel that you know a great deal about Ontario, having lived there all your life, and we would appreciate your honest opinion regarding trapping possibilities. My husband and I have a place to rent down here, also we will have quite a little capital to begin with. We would like to buy 400 acres of wilderness land that has lots of timber, a lake, and perhaps a little cleared land, and just rough it for a while, and, permanently, if we like it as well as we think we will.

Neither of us has ever lived in the city; we have no children; and we are used to country life; but we desire to get up where we will be away from civilization. My husband and I would like to run a trap line in winter and your description of the territory surrounding the mine and town at which you are employed leads us to believe it would be an ideal place to locate. In some magazines, different men (trappers, supposedly) have said that Ontario is all trapped out. However, others write and say they made a success of it. From personal observation I feel sure you can tell us whether the land adjacent to Matheson has all been trapped out. It can't have been, if, as you say, there are deer, bear and caribou around there.

My husband and I would appreciate receiving a nice long letter from you, regarding trapping, etc., and will feel that we have found a valuable friend in Northern Ontario, who it is possible, we may meet soon.
