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SPECTACULAR RESULTS OF QUARTZ LAKE DRILLING

Big Veins Showing on Surface Have Been Traced, Stripped and Trenched for 2000 Feet

One of the directors of the Quartz Lake Mines, Limited, last week gave The Advance the following information regarding the property:—
The latest report to the Directors of Quartz Lake Mines by Engineer A. E. O'Callaghan, in charge of operations at the property, together with the log and result of assays, gives spectacular results.
No. 3 diamond drill hole, driven from the north side of the lake for a distance of 717 feet, cut the vein at approximately 475 feet below the surface.
Assays were made from core and sludge taken over about five feet sections from footage 558 to 595 and gave the following results:—Assay No. 32, trace; assay No. 33, gold, \$383.40; assay No. 34, gold, \$444.20; assay No. 35, gold \$28.60; assay No. 36, gold, \$9.80; assay No. 37, gold \$34.00; assay No. 39, gold, \$15.90 per ton, together with two assays of \$2.55 and \$3.07 in silver.
These assays are over a total width of over 35 feet of vein and eliminating the two high assays obtained, are in keeping with the results of No. 1 hole, drilled some 600 feet to the east of No. 3 hole, which gave gold assays of \$11.40, \$24.80 and \$53.40 per ton.
Two more holes will be drilled, and in reference to these Mr. O'Callaghan says in part, "We moved the machine back to the south side of the lake, and are drilling a hole 100 feet west of the No. 1 hole. This is under a very promising outcrop which we uncovered. Our next hole is to be under the shaft, both these holes will be about 500 feet in length."
"Present indications look as though we will get the best results drilling towards the east. If the ore will be anything like the surface outcrop, we should get very good results."
The big veins showing in Quartz Lake have been traced, stripped and trenched for a distance of over 2,000

MAN ARRESTED AT COBALT FOR BEGGING ON STREET

People in this North Land who have been pestered by beggars, will be inclined to give the police at Cobalt due praise after the following paragraph is read. Every year a crowd of men and women from all parts of the south travel up to this country to beg in one way or another. Some suggest that they are lame or halt, or blind, or deaf, or dumb, or paralyzed, or something else. A few pretend to sell pencils or other small wares, but anyone actually taking the goods from them will certainly get some nasty looks, if not dirty words. Apparently, there is a tradition among the people of the south that this North Land is an essay mark for all kinds of petty grafting. The North Land at present has about as much as necessary to support all its own distressed and poverty-touched. In too many cases the travelling beggars reaching here do not seem to be legitimate objects of charity. Rather, they appear to be of the type that has made a good business out of begging. One good way to stop this mean form of grafting on the good-hearted is to give these beggars a free home and food in jail and then return them whence they came. This is the fate that overtook one man at Cobalt last week. In speaking of this man, The Northern News last week said:—"William John Taylor, giving his home address as Detroit, Mich., was arrested by Provincial Constable Holcroft on Monday evening and brought before Mr. A. W. Harrington, J.P., charged with wandering and begging, contrary to the statutes, and thereby being a loose, idle and disorderly person. The justice imposed a fine of \$5, or in default of payment 60 days in the district jail. In the meantime the police will make arrangements for the man's deportation as an undesirable person."

NEW LISKEARD KIWANIS START A POTATO CLUB

The formation of an interesting and rather unusual club is described as follows in the following paragraph from The New Liskeard Speaker last week.
"Under the auspices of the Agricultural Committee of the Kiwanis Club it has been definitely decided to organize a potato-growing contest between the boys ranging in age from 12 to 18 in the seven townships immediately surrounding the town. The Agricultural Committee, which is composed of A. E. Stephenson (chairman), W. G. Nixon, W. J. McKinlay and Chas. Greenwood, has been instructed by the Kiwanis Club to undertake this feature of Kiwanis work and an excellent prize list will be ready before the contest is concluded. The idea of the committee is to have an entry list of twenty-five boys resident in the following townships, Bucke, Dymond, Harris, Casey, Harley, Hudson and Kerns. Each township will be allowed representation according to the entry list received. One bushel of certified Irish Cobbler potatoes will be given to each contestant, the desire of the Kiwanis Club being to assist in the growing of a uniform marketable potato in the District of Temiskaming. Boys who desire to enter the contest should send in their names as quickly as possible, together with the name of father, age, number of lot and concession as well as township. Contestants will be selected from the list of entries. It is the intention of the club to hold a potato fair at a suitable date in the fall when a banquet will be given to contestants and the prizes awarded the winners. The club also decided to offer a silver cup as a first prize in the young farmers' judging events which will take place at the New Liskeard fair this fall."

Mr. Heron was selected out of a list of 21 applicants most of them from out-of-town, and a majority of which came from Southern Ontario.

OPENING P.O.F.L. MATCH TO BE PLAYED ON MAY 5

Special Meeting of Porcupine District Football League on Saturday Last Deals With Many Matters.

The P.D.F.L. held a special meeting on Saturday last in the town hall, and plans were completed for the season. J. Cowan, president, was in the chair, and Messrs Rowe, Bodell and P. Andrews the other officers present.

The first league game was scheduled for May 12 and this will be published as soon as arranged.
Players' forms were on hand, each club received the allotted share.

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
