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OPERATIONS RESUMED AT THE PORCUPINE GRANDE

New Board of Directors Elected. Financial Arrangements Made. Extended Operations Looked For.

Operations have been resumed on the Porcupine Grande property in the Porcupine area. The property includes some 629 acres in the Three Nations Lake area, near Three Nations station on the Porcupine branch of the T. & N. O. Some of the Porcupine Grande claims were formerly held by the Three Nations Mining Co., and some by the Allied Porcupine Mines, Ltd.

Recently a new board of directors was elected for the Porcupine Grande. They are as follows: Col. A. Gillies, Toronto, president; A. D. Armour, Ottawa, vice-president; E. M. Dillon, Toronto, secretary; C. H. Williamson, Buffalo, treasurer; J. H. Maher, Buffalo; H. L. Stokes, Buffalo; Dr. L. J. Beyer, Buffalo; J. N. Byers, Jr., Buffalo. One director is to be appointed later.

It is understood that sufficient financing has been done for immediate needs and further financing is in the hands of a firm of Toronto brokers.

Announcement has been made that intensive exploration and development of the properties is planned and Edward H. Orser, consulting mining engineer and geologist, has assumed the responsibility of the management of operations. The property has been opened up on two levels and is equipped with a steam plant, a small mill and the necessary camp buildings. Several promising ore structures have been opened up and some diamond drilling done which proved the existence of other ore structures in addition to those already known.

The Three Nations shaft is down 254 feet and 3,000 feet of workings. A small tonnage on commercial ore was opened on the 100 and 200 foot levels. A diamond drill campaign discovered a new orebody in gray carbonite schist. There is a good mining plant on the property.

MEETING OF ARGONAUT LIKELY TO BE CALLED SOON.

It is understood that a meeting of Argonaut Consolidated is to be called at an early date to decide on the line of action to be taken. In discussing the matter, Gibson's Fortnightly Review in its last issue says:

The sudden cessation of development at the Argonaut Consolidated property coupled with official word that further mining of the property was to be abandoned, is now ancient history from a market standpoint. The official notice was preceded by a few days of unexplained weakness and was followed by an avalanche of selling in which the market value of the shares was reduced to 5 cents. At time of writing the shares command a market price between 6 and 7 cents.

To say that the official decision to close the property down came as a surprise is to put it mildly despite the fact that the ticker tape for some time previous had told a tale which was disquieting to those who cared to read. The fact, however, that within a couple of weeks of the announcement of the decision which brought consternation to shareholders, official denial had been given to rumours of just such an eventuality, disarmed shareholders and made the surprise all the more complete.

Incidentally, officials of the company are being severely criticised in this connection, and it is going to take a lot of explaining to free the management from the suspicions held by a number of shareholders that the assurance given, so soon before the closing down, was not deliberately misleading.

The decision to quit followed discouraging results at the two deepest levels and was precipitated by the report of John A. Reid, who bluntly told the management that geological conditions at depth precluded the possibility of success. Thus ends one of the most checkered careers of any of the northern mining ventures, a venture which antedates the opening of either Porcupine or Kirkland Lake as "La Mine d'Or Huronia" which afterwards became Argonaut Gold and then Argonaut Consolidated, was originally operated by Jesuit priests.

The directors have promised an early report of the financial condition of the company and a special meeting is foreshadowed at which plans for the future doubtless will be divulged. Argonaut has other property and it may be decided to try again. There is one thing which ought to be said in favour of the management and that is that they did not quit until the outlook became absolutely hopeless.

A young man of 22 years of age, giving his home as Timmins, was charged in Cobalt police court recently with being a vagrant. He told the court he had no money, no friends and no work. The court imposed the minimum fine of \$1.00 or 30 days. A spectator in the court room generously contributed the dollar and said he thought he could get the young man work.

The Haileyburian last week says: "Mr. D. Clutey went to Timmins on Monday and will be employed by the Canada Northern Power Corporation there. He will be joined later by Mrs. Clutey and the family."

DEATH OF MRS. SAMPSON AT RUTHERGLEN LAST WEEK.

The Rutherglen correspondent of The North Bay Nugget last week says:—"The death of Mary Jane Brennan, widow of the late A. J. Sampson, and eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Brennan, North Bay, occurred at Rutherglen on Wednesday April 25th. Mrs. Sampson, who was in her forty-sixth year, succumbed to an attack of pneumonia, which assailed her three weeks ago. The funeral was held Friday morning from the family residence to the Catholic church where funeral service was held with Rev. Father McNally, Bonfield, officiating. Interment was made in the Rutherglen R. C. cemetery. Deceased resided with her parents in North Bay before her marriage. Her husband predeceased her three years ago. She is mourned by her parents and three brothers, Dr. A. P. Brennan, Timmins, Lawrence and Michael, North Bay, and three sisters, Mrs. A. J. Urquhart, North Bay, Mrs. J. P. Grant, Hearst and Mrs. R. Thompson, Alberta. She leaves a family of eleven children, Mrs. William Dunlap and Miss Theresa of Gogama, Frank, Alexander, Lawrence, Bridget, Violet, Cecilia, Bernadette, Thomas and Hannah at home."

NEW PROSPECTING CO. RECENTLY ORGANIZED.

Information comes from Cobalt that a new company with a capital of half a million dollars has been formed by Cyril Knight, chief geologist at the Nipissing Mines for some years, the purpose of the new company being to prospect for minerals in this North Land. Mr. Knight and his associates intend the new company to be primarily a prospecting company, the object being to search for mineral deposits, rather than to be in the market for the purpose of mining claims. The new company is known as the Cyril Knight Prospecting Company and with headquarters to be established in Toronto. The company, while enjoying close relations through interlocking directorate with the West Canada Airways, Ltd., will not be allied to or will not be a subsidiary of that company. The concern will operate entirely on its own account. Mr. Knight will be the president and manager of the new company, and because of his wide experience and expert knowledge of mining matters in this country there will be general confidence in the new company. It is understood that Mr. Knight has resigned from the Nipissing Co. staff to devote all his time and talents to the new company. The idea that the Nipissing Co. has an interest in the prospecting company is accordingly denied, the venture being said to be confined to Mr. Knight and his associates.

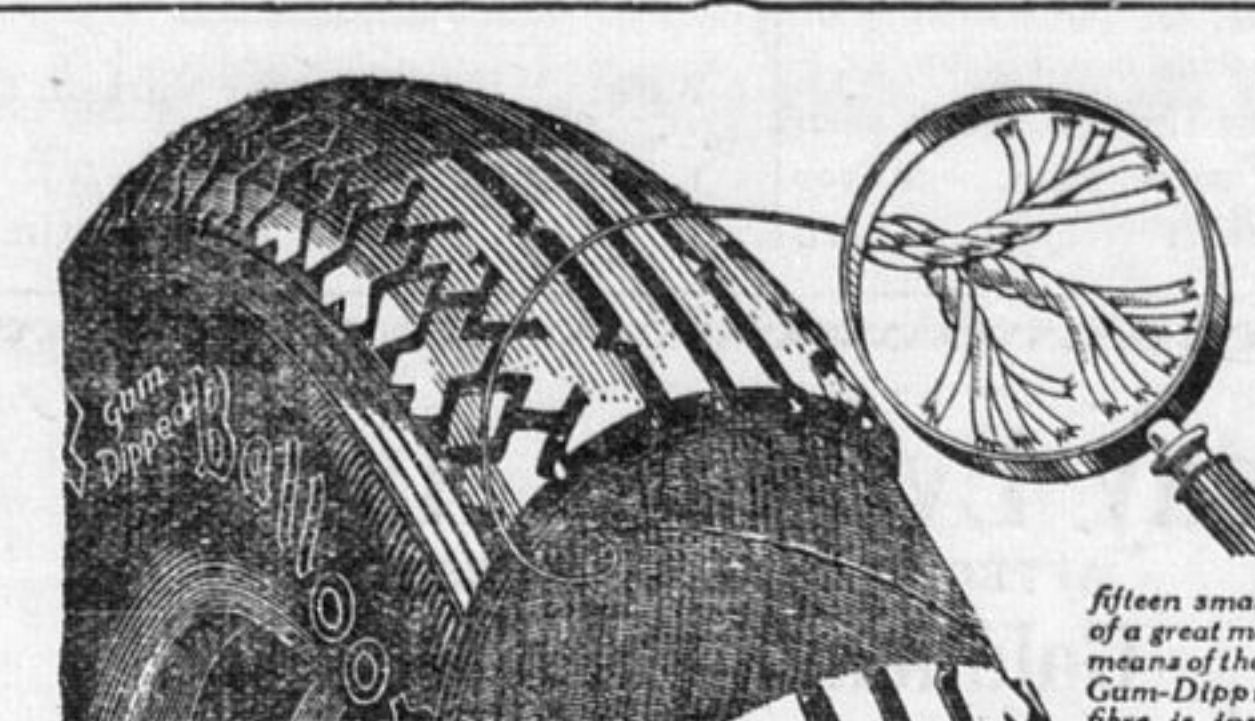
