

TO TALK PROBLEMS OF MINING ASSESSMENT

The Cobalt correspondent of The Sudbury Star writes this week:—
 "At the forthcoming annual convention of the Ontario Municipal Association, to be held in Toronto next September, a paper will be read on 'Some Assessment Problems of Mining Municipalities.' Intimation to this effect has been received from Mayor Frank Lendrum from Dr. Horace K. Britain, secretary-treasurer of the association, who writes that the programme committee has met and has agreed to have a paper on this subject included. It will be delivered, according to arrangements made, on the morning of the second day of the convention.
 Negotiations to this end have been in progress for some time. Mayor Lendrum said today it had not been

determined who would deliver the paper, but that this will be decided upon at an early date, and after the different municipal councils interested have been consulted. He declared he felt that, personally, it was a job for one of the municipal clerks, rather than for a reeve or mayor or member of the council, and he knew of three officials, any one of whom, in his opinion, would be a suitable speaker."

Former Schumacher Young Lady Passes Away in Toronto

Sorrow at Schumacher Over Sudden Death of Miss Maisie Muskett. Other News from Correspondent at Schumacher. Firemen's Annual Ball a Big Success.

Our whole community was overcast with the dark shadow of grief on Monday morning when a message was received announcing the sudden death of Miss Maisie Muskett from pneumonia and heart failure at the Western Hospital, Toronto. The deceased was a recent visitor in the camp, having left on Friday for the South, accompanied by Nurse McCleary. The late Miss Muskett was in her eighteenth year, and was the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Muskett, of Schumacher, who passed away about two years ago. A host of youthful friends, and associates in C.G.I.T. and school work were grief-stricken to hear the sad tidings. The nearest surviving relatives are one brother, Robert, and an aunt, Mrs. Wilson, both of Toronto. The remains will be brought here, and interred in the Timmins cemetery beside the father and mother. The late Miss Muskett was born at West Cobalt and until the death of her father at Schumacher two years ago she had spent all her life in the North Land. On account of the young lady being only in the hospital a couple of days before her death, an inquest was held at Toronto, the verdict finding the cause of death to be pneumonia and heart trouble.


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
