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PAST SEASON BUSIEST IN HISTORY OF PATRICIA

Nine Companies, Including the Picard, Have Plants Ready for This Spring

The Patricia District has just completed the busiest winter in its history. The last three months have seen five more mining companies get under way in addition to those already in the field. Men and horses are hard at work over the break-up and open water will show five companies with steam plants and four with gas plants busy sinking, namely: Howey Gold Mines, Ltd.; Red Lake Gold Shore Mines, Ltd.; Mammoth Red Lake Syndicate; Bathurst Mines, Ltd.; Dunkin Mines, Ltd.; St. Louis Mines, Ltd.; Jackson-Manion Mines, Ltd.; Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., and Picard Gold Mines, Ltd., while several other syndicates hope to get their properties in shape for sinking developments.

The past winter has taxed the transport companies to the limit and with the early break-up hitting them as it did, they were fortunate in getting all necessary supplies and equipment to the different properties. During the winter two transport companies were operating; the Red Lake Transport Co. Ltd., with a force of ninety teams, hauled from their own base at Bawf's Spur, while the Great West Transport Company worked out of Hudson. Thousands of tons of freight, mostly machinery, went into the field.

For the next month everything will be dormant, only to recommence with vigor as soon as open water arrives. Hudson will be a very busy place this summer. The Red Lake Transport has purchased 5 new boats one 60-ft. cruiser and four 40-ft. combination freight and passenger boats. They will have teams and waggons on every portage between the steel and Red, Woman, Narrow and Confederation Lakes. They will use small sews between all portages.

One of the Red Lake Transport officials says the day of the canoe and kicker is done in this field except for inland prospecting as the material, both in size and quantity was so large that much heavier power was required to move it. He said that their faith in the future of the district was such that they felt justified in making large expenditures for new equipment this year.

The Great West Transport is also putting on a boat between Hudson and Gold Pines and other companies will have boats.—The Northern Miner.

ADVANCES IN TREATMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS NOTED

Dr. Hague, of the Hollinger Silicosis Department, has returned from the annual spring meeting of the Laeene Society of Chest Specialists, and reports the Toronto session to have been well worth the long journey from Timmins. Several interesting advances in medical and surgical tuberculosis work were presented at the Academy of Medicine, and the evening session at the Granite Club was augmented by lantern slides and laboratory tests showing progress in tuberculosis work by this active society.

General Meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade Called for Thursday Evening of Next Week, May 10th, in the Town Hall.

The Timmins Board of Trade is at present completing a campaign for members. It is hoped to have this campaign completed this week. Canvass has been made of the business section of the town and this canvass is to be continued this week. In case anyone has been missed, it is sincerely hoped that all such will hand in their names to the secretary, J. R. Walker, or to the president, W. O. Langdon, at the earliest possible moment. It is desired this year to make the Board of Trade of the maximum of usefulness. To this end it is necessary to have members and membership fees. The idea this year, however, is to emphasize the necessity of membership, believing that the fees will look after themselves if enough members are really interested. To this end the membership fee has been made elastic, as it were. No business man need be debarred from membership by the fee. The fee will really be what he can afford. Those who can only give one or two dollars are being welcomed, while those who are in position to give more are naturally welcome also. It has been felt that if all contribute as they are able there will be a big membership and sufficient funds to carry on. There is a great deal of useful work before the Timmins Board of Trade this year, many important questions being on the programme for the year. Just to mention a few items now on the list, there are such questions as:—tourist camp, parking by-law, belt line of roads, etc. To have these questions settled right, it is believed that the larger the membership of the Board

of Trade the greater the chance for success. All are urged to join the Board of Trade and give their support and co-operation to the organization for the welfare and advancement of the town. The ordinary reader may say that there are questions of even more importance than those mentioned. Of course, that is a fact! And it is up to each individual who knows of such questions to bring them before the Board of Trade. The Board of Trade should be a clearing house for ideas for the betterment and progress of the town and every citizen should give assistance and co-operation to this effect. If you have not already joined the Board of Trade, see about it at once.

The next meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade will be held on Thursday evening of next week, May 10th, at 8 p.m., in the town hall. A specially large attendance is desired, as the programme for the evening includes many important questions for discussion. If all get wholeheartedly behind the Board of Trade it will be able to do much this year for the town and district.

N. McDougall First in OSTROSSER CUP AVERAGES

Angelo Takes Second Place and Sauve Third. Records for Ostrosser Cup Bowling

N. McDougall ran away with the championship for the Ostrosser Bowling Cup league averages, knocking over 7540 pins in 32 games, for an average of 235.

Angelo, bowling better as the season advanced, came second with 206. Sauve was only two pins behind Angelo, taking third place in the averages, while Roberts and Reid were close followers.
