RECIPE FOR ST. CHARLES COOKED SALAD DRESSING

A very tasty salad dressing that will be found most appropriate now that we are on the eve of the fresh vegetable season is the following:
1½ cups Borden's St. Charles Milk
½ cup water
1-3 cup vinegar (hot)
1 teaspoon mustard
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons flour
Dash of cayenne
2 tablespoons butter
2 egg yolks
Dilute milk with water and bring to scalding point in a double boiler. Thoroughly mix dry ingredients. Add egg yolks. Blend gradually with dry ingredients. Pour hot milk slowly over the mixture, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler, add butter, cook until thickened. Pour in heated vinegar gradually, strain and cool.

Medical Examination of the School Children in Timmins

Will Commence Soon Under Auspices of School Board, Local Medical Society and Board of Health. Medical Society Hears Interesting and Helpful Address from Dr. Ralph, Toronto, on Gastro-Intestinal Disorders.

The regular meeting of the Medical Society of the Porcupine District was held in the Empire Hotel, on Friday evening of last week. The main speaker of the evening was Dr. F. W. Ralph, of Toronto, and he gave an expert lecture on gastrointestinal disorders to the local doctors. The week previously the same address was presented at the Mayo clinic to the leading gastro-intestinal specialists of America. Dr. Ralph spoke in a free and conversational style using only brief notes to supplement his very good memory, and bringing very clearly the most interesting facts to his audience. It is gratifying to know that the most up-to-date information is being brought to the home towns of practitioners remote from the large centres under the auspices of the Ontario Medical Association.

During the business session of the meeting last Friday a unanimous vote was passed in favour of a scheduled regular physical examination of school children, to commence very soon under the local Board of Health, in conjunction with the local Medical Society, and with the approval of the public school board. Dr. Phair and staff, of the Provincial Department of Health, will be present to inaugurate the new examination system and place Timmins in its present category as enterprising enough to foresee the value of preventive medicine in its public schools. The local Medical Society is sponsoring this valuable work and will appreciate the whole-hearted support of the parents in completing this survey. Permission cards for medical examination will be issued to the junior grades only at the commencement, as it is felt that in this manner school examination work will not be interfered with in the senior grades, and the latter

will be followed up as soon as possible after the summer vacation.

The new hospital is rapidly nearing completion, and it will not be long before patients will be admitted to the new wing. Members of the Medical Society of the Porcupine District are naturally very greatly interested in the success of the new hospital. One local member of the Society says:—"It is to be hoped that the proposed Board of Governors, or really a 'contact committee' will be appointed to assist the Sisters in their new enterprise to make the institution as public and self-supporting as possible. It will be through such a committee that gratuities, donations, etc., would be gratefully received, and plans arranged to augment the furnishings and equipment necessary to carry on this newest public utility. Charitable institutions and societies should be prepared to stand back of our new hospital and assist as they see fit. Several pieces of apparatus and equipment could be subscribed at low cost to individuals desiring to contribute."
