ACONDA AT KAMISKOTIA HAS GOOD POSSIBILITIES

Annual Meeting at Ottawa Hears Favourable Reports on Kamiskotia Property.

The annual meeting of the Aconda Mines was held at Ottawa on Thursday last. A large number of shareholders were present and according to the despatches last week the reports and other proceedings were considered as very satisfactory. Mr. D. B. Rochester, the president, gave a comprehensive statement of the activities of the company from the time of its incorporation, and presented reports, including the balance sheets and financial statements, which were unanimously accepted. These showed that the company had on hand on the 31st of March of this year \$91,270.56 and that with the stock unsold in the treasury the company was in a strong financial position.

Dr. Armstrong, the consulting engineer of the company, was questioned as to the possibilities of developing commercial ore bodies in the showings that were now being drilled at Kamiskotia. This question brought from Dr. Armstrong the following interesting statement:

"They are good. Out of the 13 exploratory holes drilled, six indicate ore mineralization, namely copper, zinc, gold, mineralized some of them over commercial widths. These ore sections occur as replacements within forty feet of disseminated and massive pyrite or iron sulphides which has been traced by our drilling for a length of nearly 500 feet and which probably will be found to be longer. All of the six or seven showings of ore which we trenched last Fall lie within this zone. We know that we have structural conditions favourable to ore depositions. Our surface trenching and diamond drilling has shown the presence of ore of commercial grade. With these two essential conditions fulfilled we feel sanguine and further explorations after the snow goes off we feel will meet with success."

Another question was asked to the effect of "How many claims in this

group have been thoroughly prospected so far?" and Dr. Armstrong replied:

"Only four of the twenty-one claims in this group have been prospected and these not thoroughly, as the company did not option this group until late last fall, that is, only a few weeks before the snow came. It will be our first task immediately the ground is bare to intensively prospect the whole group. It is quite probable that further surface discoveries will be made as the number of diabase dykes with which the ore appears to be associated cross the property."

The results of holes 13 and 14, which had not been previously reported, were given. No. 13 hole gave assays in gold, copper and zinc, of \$3.25 over eight feet, \$3.32 over five feet, \$9.06 over 2 1/2 feet, and \$15.30 over 1 1/2 feet, while hole No. 14 gave \$8.20 over three feet, \$26.50 over 1 1/2 feet, \$7.98 over 3 1/2 feet and \$12.80 over five feet. The results of these drills give a mineralized section over 150 feet in length of very encouraging results.

The former directors, namely D. B. Rochester, S. S. Holden, D. A. MacGillivray, E. Ryan, F. W. Perras, Joseph McDonough and Charles McD. Logan were unanimously re-elected.

ANNUAL MEETING LAST WEEK OF HILL TOP MINES

The annual meeting of the Hilltop Gold Mines was held at Toronto last week. This property is an amalgamation of the Kennedy Boston Gold Mines and the Douglas and Thorburn veteran claims, and is situated in Catharine township about three miles from Boston Creek. There is a good mining plant on the property and considerable work has been done.

The reports given to the shareholders of Hilltop Gold Mines, Limited, at the annual meeting were substantially the same as those previously mailed to them with the notice of the meeting. The mine was closed down during the last five months of 1927, said President A. M. Woolnough, but during September, October and November enough money was paid into the treasury to enable operations to be resumed. Outstanding accounts were paid and an electrical plant capable of sinking to

1,500 feet or lower was purchased. Installation was completed on March 31st and the work of pumping out the mine started immediately. This was completed on Wednesday of last week, and further shaft sinking was commenced, with a depth of 1,000 feet as the objective. The following were elected as directors for the ensuing year: A. M. Woolnough, A. C. Thorburn, G. Tough, E. H. Birkett and A. J. Young. These directors are the same as for last year, with the exception that E. H. Birkett takes the place of G. Wilkie.

STILL PAYS DIVIDENDS AFTER HALF A CENTURY

In view of the discussion recently at the annual meeting and elsewhere in regard to Dome having two more years of life, the following from The Engineering and Mining Journal says: "A good mine dies hard. About four years ago it was whispered that the Homestake in the Black Hills of South Dakota, which had been paying dividends almost continuously since 1875, had become 'a liquidating proposition.' It took no elaborate calculation to discover, on the basis of published ore reserves, that at the then current rate of production only sufficient ore remained to last for 1 1/2 more years. The price of the shares dropped to \$35 in the summer of 1924, though in that year the company increased its dividends from \$6 per year to \$7, since maintained. That made a nice yield, as any present-day Wall Street operator would readily admit—something better than 20 per cent. on one's money."

"Now comes the best Homestake report in years. Based on current production, the mine still boasts of 11 1/2 years' ore reserves, as four years ago, though the actual tonnage is a little less. The profits made by the company in 1927 rose considerably—because the grade of ore treated increased to \$4.87 per ton, compared with only \$4.10 last year, and from \$3.66 to \$3.87 for the three years before that. No comment is made in the report as to whether the increased grade can be maintained or not; if so—if \$4.87 is anything like the grade of the fifteen-odd million tons of ore that remain in the mine—the stockholders are a good deal better off than they had any right to expect. Some companies hold back information in their effort to keep bad news to themselves; it would appear that the Homestake leans over backward in its conservatism, and prefers an occasional pleasant surprise for its stockholders."

"The recent reports make it clear that Homestake is far from dead. One fancies that little will be heard about its being 'a liquidating proposition,' for a time, anyway. If the ore reserve decrease no faster than they have for the last four years, the company will still be in business at the old stamping ground in 1970. This, of course, is unlikely but it would be interesting to the stockholders to know more about the possibilities for finding new ore."

"Incidentally, it was fifty years ago that Homestake levied its first and only assessment from the proceeds of which it built its first mill."

The next regular meeting of the town council is scheduled for Monday, May 14th, commencing at 4 p.m.
