**INVERNESS MINES WORK
ON KAMISKOTIA CLAIMS**

Development Carried Out at Kamiskotia and Kirkland Lake Properties.
The Inverness Mines, Limited, operating as an exploration and development company chiefly, have recently sent a report to shareholders especially dealing with Kirkland Lake, Kamiskotia and Narrow-Woman Lake properties. The report says:—
"Considerable surface work was carried on at the Kirkland Lake property No. 1. This property consists of 240 acres and at the close of year the total amount of trenching and stripping amounted to about 10,000 feet. Test pits were sunk and also a shaft to a depth of 35 feet, where values were obtained running in gold from twenty cents to \$11.49 per ton. Upon the advice of W. E. Simpson, M.E., we feel that this property should be diamond drilled and developed much more vigorously than ever before. Everything will be done to raise sufficient finances to carry out a campaign of this kind at this property."

"To the south and joining us is a large group of claims where New York capital is interested and joining this group again is the Melvor property, which, it is understood, will be opened up soon for development on a large scale. Joining our property to the west a large group of claims has been taken over and a company formed under the name of Scott-Kirkland. Then from a press report we learn that slightly to the north of us there is a group of claims that is to be diamond drilled by interests closely affiliated with the Wright-Hargreaves Mines. Again to the south-west is the Aelsbach Mining Company and the Four Nations Reserve Mining Company, both of which are meeting with every success, and these two companies are being developed under a most vigorous campaign. It is the intention of your directors to focus their activity more particularly during the coming season at this No. 1 property."

"At property No. 2 in Porcupine, or now better known as South Kamiskotia, your company added to the 90 acres, making a total of 160 acres, and last summer a similar campaign of development was carried on to that at Kirkland Lake. A shaft was sunk to a depth of 35 feet and considerable trenching and stripping was done. A camp is on the property capable of accommodating 20 or 25 men."
"No work was done at property No. 3 in the West Shining Tree area last year, as it is the intention of your company's directors to hold this property and see what development by neighbouring companies brings forth. The government completed a motor road about half a mile to the south of this group and a power line was also extended into the camp, assuring the operating companies of transportation and power. The Atlas and Westree have been operating for some time and big activity is looked forward to throughout the camp during the coming summer."

"The Narrow-Woman Lake property of 720 acres, known as property No. 4, was purchased by your company under option and a company was formed known as the Narlak Development Company. This company was taken over by a broker the same week and practically all the financing has been done in Buffalo, N.Y. A mining engineer's report was made by H. E. Harcourt, M.E., and on the strength of this a more rigid development campaign is planned this year. Your company retained a 10% interest in this property."
"Your company acquired six claims in the Goudreau district, about half a mile southwest of the Kozak Gold Mines, which caused such comment last year. From all reports we receive from prospectors and mining engineers, the development of this district can be looked forward to with special interest this early spring and the possibilities for your company selling this property at a substantial cash consideration looks most favourable."

"Your company has received letters asking about the listing of its shares. This is most certainly the intention of your directors, but it would be unwise to list the shares of this company or any other company, until the market can be maintained and protected in every way. The listing of these shares would not assist us at this time in the financing of our properties, but would be more of a detriment to the individual shareholders."

**TRACES OF GOLD FOUND
IN MANY OTHER METALS**
Back about as far as history goes, certain men have spent time and energy in vain attempts to transmute other metals into the precious metals. Often the attempt has been no more than a swindling plan, but in a few cases the men at the game have not only been honest but they have seemed actually to be successful in a small way. An explanation for this apparent success, which, however, could never be successfully followed up is now given by a London, England, scientist.
Sir Ernest Rutherford, the famous physicist, in a lecture the other day at the Royal Institute on "The Transformation of Matter," said that it was well-known that minute traces of gold were to be found in

many substances, and where gold was said to have been produced from base metals, the gold was no doubt there all the time.
In the last few years the press had been full of claims by people that they could change mercury or lead into gold or some other metal. The first case was the conversion of mercury into gold by the passage of electric current through an ordinary mercury vapor. This claim had been made within recent years by German and Japanese scientists, and much about this miracle has appeared in the newspapers. Actually the minute amount of gold thus "transmuted" was present to begin with either in the mercury or the electrodes, for when other experimenters had carried out precisely the same experiment after having first taken the precaution of removing all foreign substances from the materials used, not a trace of gold was produced.

The theory of the permanency and indestructibility of the atom was, until the end of the last century, the foundation of chemical and physical science. Then came the sensational discovery of radium and other radioactive substances, which had revolutionized all ideas of the atom and the structure of matters. The study of the transformations which occurred in these radio-active bodies was one of the most fascinating branches of science. Before one's eyes these substances could be seen transforming themselves into other substances by ejecting alpha, beta and gamma particles from their atoms.
