Floods at South Porcupine Causing Considerable Loss

Boy Scouts Do Great Work in Assisting Overcome Situation. Township of Tisdale Council Deals With Many Questions. Other Interesting News from South Porcupine.

South Porcupine, May 2nd, 1928. Special to The Advance.

The council of Tisdale township met at the council chambers on Wednesday, April 25th, with the reeve and all the councillors present. Owing to Clerk Evans being absent, due to the illness of his mother, his place was taken by Assessor Smith. After the minutes of last meeting, considerable correspondence was read. Quite an amount of it was requests for charity cases or re taxes. The Coniaram Mines objected to the price charged for the use of the township tractor to move their crusher. The usual rate was charged but owing to the break-up of the roads there was not as much accomplished as had been hoped. Dr. Kinsman interviewed the council re support for the Porcupine hockey club. The chief contention against having given support for the past year seemed to be the lack of a properly itemized account of expenditures made. Dr. Kinsman stated that it was hoped to revive the Mines league in camp, as well as the usual N.O.H.A. league. Mr. Geo. D. Hamilton, reeve, representing Whitney, interviewed the council in regard to the flood. Councillor Laforest was delegated to go down to the scene of the pulp-wood congestion with him and see what they thought of the matter. Reeve Gallagher had wired Hon. Mr. Finlayson but it did not seem as though the township itself could do much. Mr. W. Buttrick interviewed the council asking for planks for crossing and also lights on the Boston townsite but as this townsite is still assessed as acreage instead of town lots it was decided places closer in needed attention first. F. Rich again was present re cost of putting in his sewer. As he did not seem to remember definitely what he had promised when wanting this sewer, despite the fact that he was in a vicinity where sewers were not feasible owing to high water conditions, etc., he was asked by the reeve to come

back when the clerk would be present to place before him his signed agreement in black and white. Mr. M. Bessette inquired re sewers on Commercial avenue. He will be sent a letter when this is further considered. It was decided to have 100 copies of the financial statement of the township printed by The Porcupine Advance. Councillor Williams thought the Board of Health should be asked to inspect rooming houses as to number in house, etc., as it was felt some of these places were more crowded than proper sanitary conditions would warrant. The bill for seven hundred dollars for the two emergency pumps was passed. (These pumps were got just in the nick of time.) A by-law to amend the taxicab by-law was passed. It had been thought that the township had no rights over motor buses. Now it is learned that buses picking up passengers and dropping them within the bounds of the township may be licensed by the township for same. The reeve reported the special act for the consolidation of the townships debentures as having been passed by the Provincial Government. This was held up for a while by a petition sent in from here which rather foolishly stated that this matter had not been placed before the electors. People should make sure of the facts before signing such a document. On Councillor Hawkin's wanting to know where they got such an argument the answer was made that it was not an argument at all. Someone merely said it, then some others signed it. As a matter of fact this voting was well and legally advertised last August and we believe the fact that it had been favourably voted on was reported as a news item in the papers of the district. Where the petitioners got their information, on rather misinformation, is hard to tell, but surely a person who is going to put his name to a petition effecting his township should have interest enough in the welfare of that township to ascertain the truth of the statement to which he is putting his name. It is said that a number of names on the list are not even legally qualified to vote. It is believed the Provincial Government may make an investigation re the getting out of this petition. The routine bills and salaries were passed.

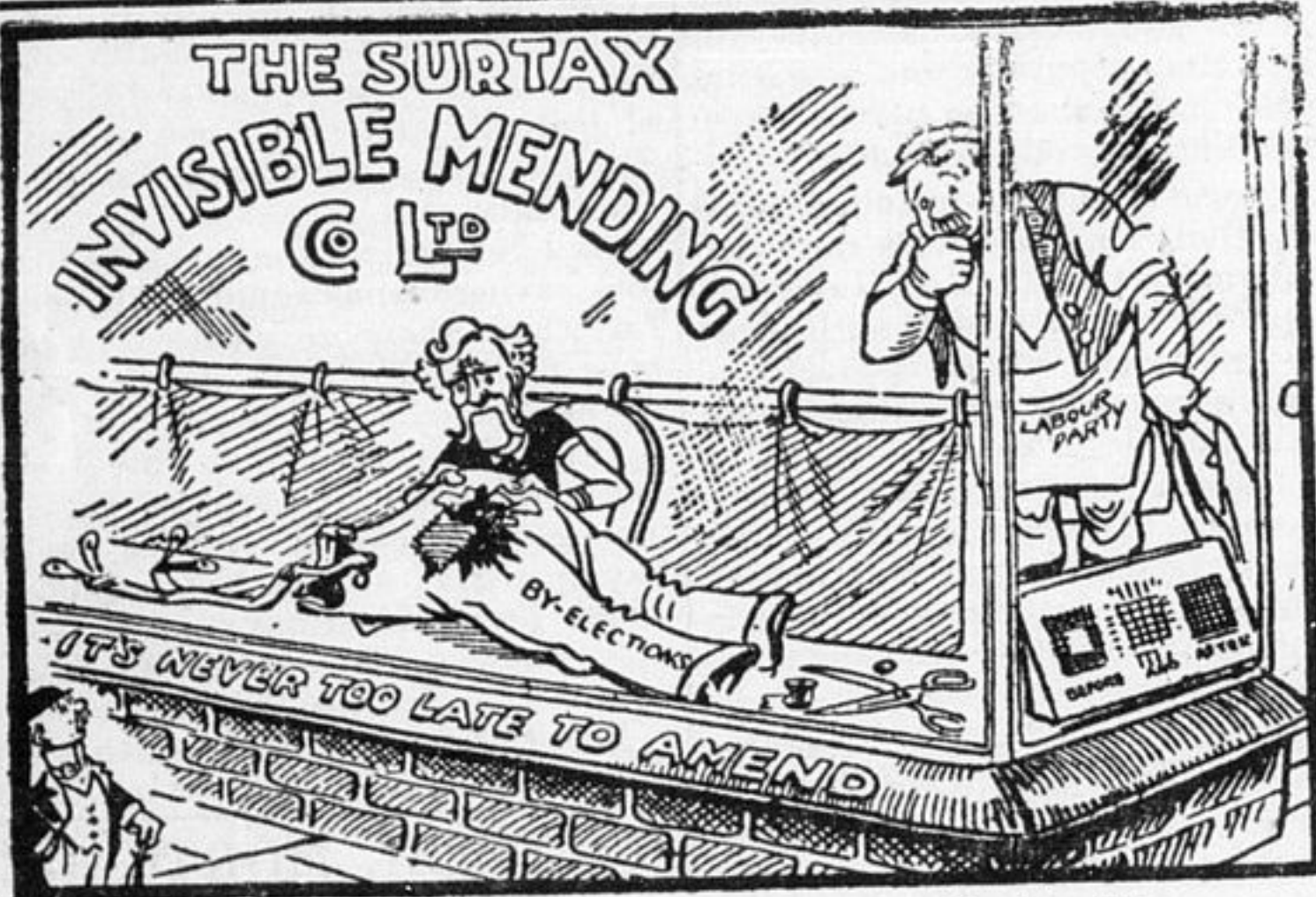
