Wednesday. The flood situation has been the main topic here this week. "Seeing Venice' seemed to be the idea not only of everyone in town but of nearly all in camp who had their motor cars out on Sunday when the waters commenced to show a rapid rise. Scoutmaster Vernon Andrew called out his men, and these lads, staff in hand gave very valuable assistance on Sunday and Monday. They worked in three-hour shitts patrolling Railroad street and giving assistance wherever needed. A car would get swamped out in the water. No one on the side-walk could get to it but the quick-eyed Scouts would soon have their punt propelled to the side of the motor in trouble bringing the help required. The township's gang were given much assistance in the raising of the side-walk by these same active lads. On Monday children who had missed the regular conveyance sent to bring them through the water were patrolled safely over Railroad street by the alert Scouts. On Tuesday all traffic by vehicle was stopped on this thoroughfare as the flood was lifting the bridge from the piles. Mr. Sterling came out and is having it weighted down with loads of iron in the hopes of preventing further damage. Postmaster McLellan informs us that the mail will probably have to be taken by boat. There are many arguments as to whether the flood is greater than that of 1913, but Station-master Clark states that it has reached a higher level around his reserve. Mr. J. Huot had a mark on his property on Commercial avenue showing where it had reached in 1913 and at five o'clock this (Tuesday) afternoon the water was three inches higher than that mark, and still rising. Levels have been taken all the way down to the pulp-wood congestion and they are nearly uniform with the flooded area that far down, while 33 below this congested spot they get below this congested spot the considerably lower.
