will be held at Haileybury to-day, Thursday, May 3, for the purpose of receiving report and financial and other statements from the liquidator dealing with the company. The shareholders will also be asked to authorize the liquidator to execute on behalf of the company an agreement extending the time or times for making payment for the balance of the shares of Gold Hill Mines Ltd. optioned to the late C. B. Cronyn on December 10, 1925. The option was the one which expired on April 20, and it is suggested the extension be for another three months.

The late C. B. Cronyn had an option on 550,000 shares of Gold Hill Mines Ltd., at 30 cents per share, the option carrying the condition of being transferable. The final option elapsed on March 28, 1928, with 20 days being allowed before default, making the date April 20. Mr. Cronyn's death, however, brought about certain changes, and the option was taken up by C. A. Foster, Toronto, on 368,500 shares, and S. J. Birnbaum, Toronto on 181,500 shares.

Both these parties took up part of their option and then, assigned to W. R. Sweeney, Toronto. On March 31, after giving effect to various assignments and purchases the ownership of the option was as follows: C. A. Foster, \$8,500; S. J. Birnbaum, 79,500; W. R. Sweeney, 400,000.

The liquidator says Mr. Sweeney on April 18, took up 50,000 shares under his option, at 30 cents per share, leaving a balance of 438,000 shares, which option is now in default and may be cancelled at once on notice.

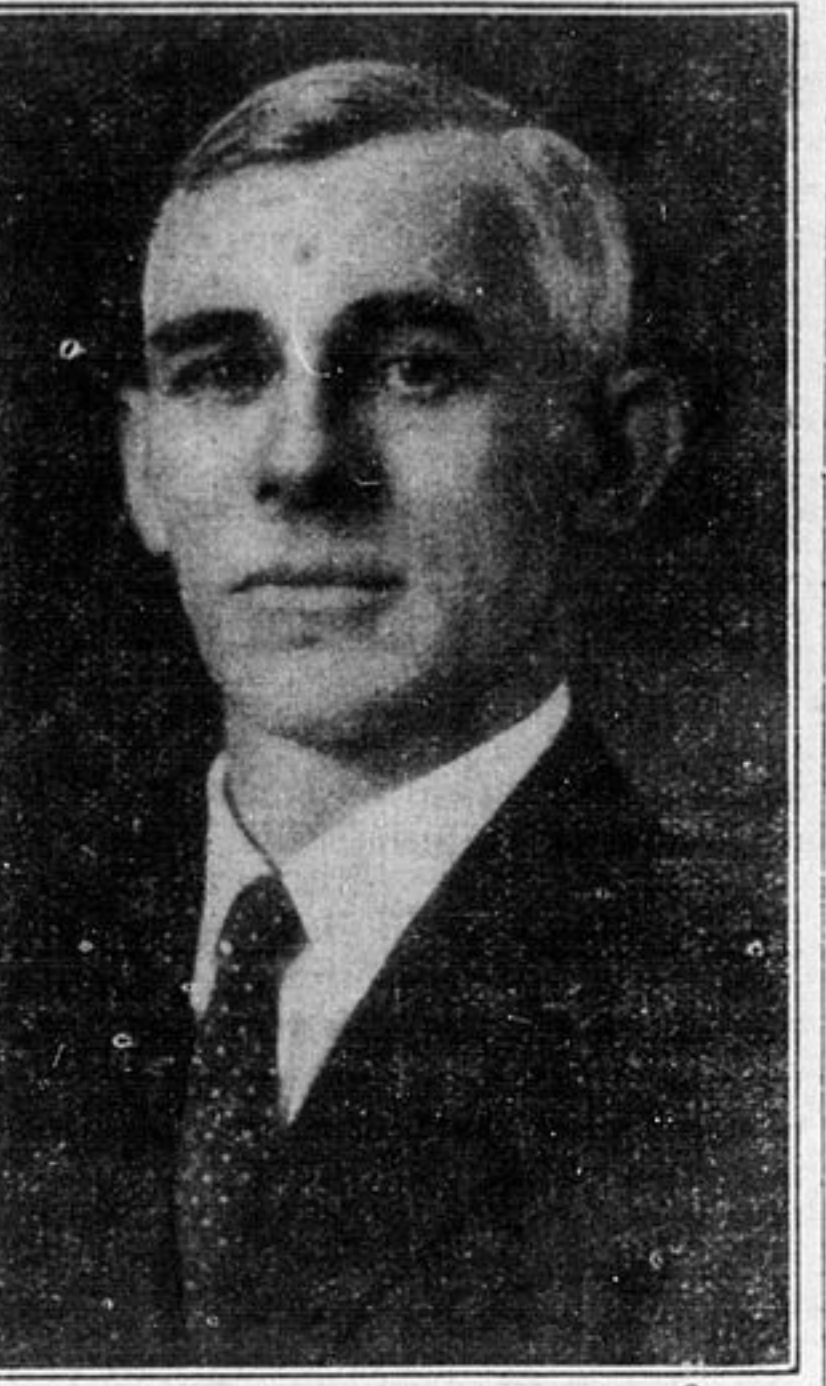
The liquidator reports that on March 31st, 1928, an annual meeting of shareholders of Gold Hill Mines, Ltd., was held, and a proxy enabling the company's shares to be represented at these meetings was executed and delivered to the officers of Gold Hill Mines Ltd., by himself as liquidator.

SKETCH OF FORMER VERY POPULAR TIMMINS MAN

Canada Northern Power Co. Review Writes Up Mr. W. F. B. Cadman Now.

Hosts of friends in Timmins and district will be interested in the following sketch appearing, together with the picture of Mr. W. F. B. Cadman, now of the head office at New Liskeard, but formerly manager of the Power & Telephone Co. branch at Timmins, appearing in a recent issue of C.N.P.C. Review, the attractive



journal published in the interests of the employees of Canada Northern Power Corporation. The Advance is indebted to the C.N.P.C. Review for the loan of the cut. The accompanying article is as follows:—

"Meet Mr. William Fergus Browne Cadman, ladies and gentlemen, our popular Distribution Engineer. Everybody knows him as Ferg, in spite of the hyphen. Ferg was born at Pitlochry, Perthshire, on March 14th, 1884, and by a peculiar coincidence gave us these intimate details of his life on his natal day. He has had an exceptionally long career with the company, as, after coming to New Liskeard in April, 1905, he commenced service with the Cobalt Light & Power Co., Limited, in November of the same year. After four years with that company in Cobalt he was transferred to Timmins with the Porcupine Telephone Lines, Ltd., and remained there until April, 1912.

"His next move was to Sturgeon Falls (a point served by Northern Ontario Light & Power Co., Ltd.) with the appointment of Division Superintendent, and he remained there until April 4, 1920.

"We find him again at Timmins as Division Superintendent, immediately succeeding Mr. B. V. Harrison (our present General Manager) who had been transferred to the Cobalt office of the company.

"Ferg, quickly took hold of the important work ahead of him in the growing Porcupine gold camp, and there, as everywhere else, he created numerous friends.

"The Scot is a ubiquitous animal, and it was not surprising that Ferg's cronies were from the Land of the Leal. It is not consistent with our editorial dignity to make any pun in this biography about Ferg, and his Scotch friends.

"In June, 1927, we find him with us in head office as Distribution Engineer, fully deserving of the promotion earned through long and faithful service.

"He is an Anglican in religion, a past master of Sturgeon Falls Lodge A. F. & A. M., a member of Northern Lights R.A.M., Timmins, and a member of the New Liskeard Kiwanis Club.

"He is an ardent footballer, and played against the team sent out by the English Football Association two years ago, acquitting himself very creditably. He also has an idea he can curl.

"He is exceedingly popular with the ladies, and recently the Kiwanis Club of Timmins made a presentation to him consisting of some pieces of silver, all contributed by broken hearts in Timmins.

"The problems of distribution and service are, we feel sure, in very capable hands with him.
