## Ten Years Ago in Timmins

FROM DATA IN THE PORCUPINE ADVANCE FILES

For Mothers' Day in 1918, the day being May 10th, the South Porcupine Nurseries, of which Bert Devar was the proprietor, brought in to Timmins a wagon load of cut flowers and potted plants, all of which were taken up by eager buyers. The plants and flowers were all home-grown.

At the town council meeting on May 6th, 1918, there were two applications received for the position of chief of police for Timmins. One was from Provincial Officer J. Wilson, of South Porcupine, and the other from Provincial Officer Aekroyd, of Timmins. The South Porcupine man was given the position. The report of the retiring chief of police, John Clark, was received by the council. During the six months under Chief Clark, the town's revenues were augmented by \$11,875.00, the items being as follows:—poll tax collected, \$1,970.00; dog taxes, \$300.00; municipal licenses, \$1760.00; and police court fines, etc., \$7827.00. In the six months, the report said, there had been 212 cases, only four of this number being dismissed by the magistrate. Chief Clark said that good work had also been done by the police in street patrol work, registering of aliens, and the attention given to aliens, the case of Consowitch being specially referred to. In view of the cosmopolitan character of the population, Chief Clark thought the town

was especially law-abiding and orderly. He made particular reference to the good work of Constable Mr. Greer, who had shown himself a very capable officer. Mayor McLaughlin brought to attention of council the condition of some of the backyards in town, these being considered unsanitary and a menace to health. There were old shacks, log piles, wood, rubbish, old shacks, and whatnot. He urged a stern cleaning-up. On motion of Councillors Brazeau and Dr. McInnis it was decided to purchase four barrels of oil to experiment with the oiling of the roads here, the town to pay half the cost of the oil.

On Tuesday evening, May 7th, 1918, a number of the friends of Mr. W. M. Summerhayes gathered at the home of Mr. R. J. Ennis, manager of the McIntyre-Porcupine Mines, and a very pleasant social evening was enjoyed. Advantage was taken of the occasion to express appreciation of the fine qualities of Mr. Summerhayes, who has been very popular in the camp during his stay here as manager of the Porcupine Crown. Mr. Summerhayes was presented with an address and silver plate as a mark of the esteem in which he was held and the regret felt at his departure. On account of the closing of the Porcupine Crown Mr. Summerhayes was leaving the camp.

Ten years ago the McIntyre was the only dividend payer in the camp, announcing a five per cent. dividend to be paid on June 15th, to shareholders of record May 31st. The disbursement called for \$180,000.00. The McIntyre had been repeatedly asked by the press as to its intentions in regard to dividends but refused to say anything in the matter, but just kept on paying the dividends as usual, despite the war.

In an editorial in the issue of May 8th, 1918, The Advance stressed the need for continued gold production, pointing out that while some months previously in the United States there had been a foolish agitation to close down the gold mines as non-essential, this view had been discarded as soon as the people had time to think and study the facts of the case. "Gold is the basis of modern financing and trade," said The Advance, "and to tamper with this fundamental industry would be to court disaster in a commercial way. Gold is the medium and standard of exchange and consequently the production of this precious metal is absolutely necessary to maintain the nation's standing. It took some time for these facts to be firmly established in the public mind in the United States, but now there is a firmly held conviction that the stability of the nation depends in large measure upon the gold industry, and the United States Government is working on a plan to give substantial assistance to the increased production of gold."

Ten years ago a local man reached home after his day's work to find that he had lost his wife, his child, a quantity of clothing and \$20.00 in cash. A friend of his had also left town along with the other valuables. Complaint being made to the police, the couple were picked up at North Bay, charges being held against them here for travelling without a permit, being aliens, as well as for the theft of everything taken but the women. The case was eventually settled by the husband taking back everything but the man.

The Advance ten years ago was inclined to be sarcastic in regard to a boxing match here between Young Sampson, who was travelling the country as a strong man, and Frederick Finch, who had attracted attention to himself here for months by his odd methods of training. He called himself the North Land Greyhound, and issued challenges right and left. The night of the boxing match, the police visited the theatre before the event and warned the combatants that it must not be a genuine fight. Both promised it would only be a boxing exhibition. It was an exhibition all right, but there was no boxing," commented The Advance. When Finch was stripped for the fight, he was so thin that Chief Clark told Sampson that if he hit Finch with any force and cracked any ribs he would arrest the strong man on the spot. "Then I'll have to hit him only in the face and ears," said Sampson, grinning. The "fight" was, perhaps, the greatest burlesque ever seen in a boxing ring. Finch did not seem to know the first thing about boxing, and in addition he was too thin and frail for such work. Sampson hit him when and where he liked, but showed fine sportsmanship in taking rare care not to hurt the misguided fellow. Sampson chased Finch all over the stage, and some people were inclined to think that Finch looked very foolish all through. But Finch was paid \$25.00 for his part in the evening so he was not quite so simple as he might have been. For months he had kidded the people, or some of them, that he was a boxer, but after the Sampson incident he soon disappeared.

"Talk about the condition of the back yards," said one citizen to The Advance ten years ago, "but what about the condition of the streets? Some people are using the streets for back yards. Actually in the business part of the town there have been woodpiles on the streets and in the public lanes and some, indeed, have gone so far as to use the cement side-

walks for chopping blocks in the matter of splitting wood. It's all right to make people clean up their back yards, but it would be just as well also to stop any use of the streets for back yards."

Ten years ago The Advance recorded the appointment of F. H. Bonnerville, acting chief after the retirement of Chief Norman Burke at Cobalt, to act as chief of police for the Silver Town. Cobalt has had a lot of chiefs of police and some day a man with a good head for statistics should make a list of all the chiefs of police who have been in office in this North Land.

The ice went out of Lake Temiskaming on April 30th, 1918. This was about ten days earlier than in the average previous year. Each year The Haileyburian offered a prize for the person guessing nearest to the exact date of the ice going out of the lake. In 1918 no one guessed correctly, one saying April 29th, and three others placing the event at May 1st. The Haileyburian was generous in the matter and gave a prize to each of the four coming within a day of being correct.

Fast and reckless driving of automobiles was rare enough in Timmins ten years ago to be considered news. Hence, this item in The Advance on May 8th:—"Late Saturday night or early Sunday morning a crowded auto came tearing through the town without lights. The police made an effort to stop the machine, but the auto driver refused to halt, and the absence of lights made it impossible to distinguish the number of the machine. The police have an idea who the culprits were and they may face unpleasant proceedings as a consequence of their foolish offence."

Great interest is taken at present in the wild geese stopping at Timmins on their way north. Ten years ago the wild geese gave this town the go-by, but wild duck visited here. The Advance in commenting on the visit said:—"There was a flock of wild duck at Miller Lake on Friday. It is not often that the ducks will come so close to town, and still less often that they will stay so long in so exposed a position."

Among the local and personal notes in The Advance ten years ago were the following:—"Mr. and Mrs. Len Cousins are leaving this week for a vacation in Toronto." "Born—in Timmins, on Tuesday, April 23rd, 1918, to Mr. and Mrs. D. Ostrosser—a daughter." "May 24th, according to Dan Cosgrove, is famous in history because it is going to be this year the night of the Firemen's annual ball." "Mr. L. Stadelman is up from Cobalt, looking after the store here, his brother, Ivan, now being away in Toronto, having donned the khaki. Mrs. Ivan Stadelman is visiting friends and relatives in Toronto, Brantford and other southern points."

"Mr. Alex Stirling, superintendent of the Ontario Government roads in this district, returned last week from Renfrew, accompanied by his two sons, and will take up the work now in progress here for new roads and improved roads." "Commencing on Sunday, the Timmins Baptist church will hold the regular Sunday services in the Old Empire theatre. The services have been held up to date in the I.O.O.F. hall. The Baptists are this week securing plans for a new church building, which it is proposed to erect at an early date for the use of the growing congregation." "Mr. Ed. Church, of the Hollinger electrical staff, has resigned and left for Los Angeles." "Rev. J. Macdonald left on Friday for England for a visit previous to taking up his new charge at St. Joseph's Island."

"Married—At Timmins, on May 6th, 1918, by the Rev. R. S. Cushing, B.A., L.Th., Carl Anton Johansson and Elizabeth Alexandra Halverson, both of this town." "Martin Myles was elected D.D.G.M. for this district of the I.O.O.F. today." "P. L. McHale, who has conducted a jewelry store here for some months past, left on Friday for the south. Most of the stock he had here was sold by public auction in the week or two previous. The fixtures, etc., left in the store are also said to have been sold, but on Saturday the bailiff took possession of these to satisfy a lien note held on them by the former owner, Mr. M. J. Roche." "The box social and dance given in the Miners' Union hall on Friday evening of last week under the auspices of the committee interested in the securing of a new general hospital for the camp proved a very enjoyable and successful event. There was a good attendance, and the boxes were many and excellent in quality and brought good prices." "Dr. C. W. Haentschel has been appointed registrar for the District of Temiskaming in connection with the registration of all the man power and woman power of Canada this June." "The population of Sudbury is now 7,216, an increase of 174 over 1917." "Prof. Sharpe, of New Liskeard occupied the pulpit of Byrnes Presbyterian church on Sunday, and delivered good, orthodox sermons morning and evening."

The concert recently given by the Irish Choir, under the direction of Mr. James Geils, in the Goldfields theatre after the church services on a Sunday some weeks ago, netted a neat sum for the District C.A.S. Shelter, receipt of which has been duly acknowledged with thanks. The fact that the theatre management donated the theatre for the evening was especially appreciated.
