REEVE TO ADDRESS THE MUNICIPAL ASSOCIATION

Conference at Cobalt Selects C. V. Gallagher to Present Matter of Mining Assessment

Another conference of representatives of Northern municipalities was held at Cobalt last week. Among the delegates in attendance were: Timmins, H. E. Montgomery, clerk; Tisdale township, D. Kerr, councillor; Schumacher; Teck, Reeve Carter, Councillor Pollock and Clerk McBain; Coleman township, Councillor Mutin and Clerk Shepherd; Cobalt, Mayor Frank Lendrum. The chief question discussed was the selection of a representative to address the meeting of the Ontario Municipal Association at Toronto at Exhibition time to present the North Land's attitude in the matter of mining assessment. The unanimous choice of the meeting for this address was Mr. C. V. Gallagher, reeve of Tisdale, the representatives believing that he was the ideal man to present the case in the south. In the discussion, the delegates were agreed that the present method of assessment of mines work to the detriment of the municipalities. Another matter touched upon was the reservation of one lot of four by the Government. The matter income derived from investments by mining companies was also referred to. This should be assessed, they thought, where the mine was located, irrespective of where the head office might be located.

KIDNAPPING CHARGE BEFORE POLICE COURT

Mother of Baby Charged With Stealing Two-Year-Old from its Foster Parents. Other Cases at Court Here.

At police court here this week Mrs. Pearl Bellefeuille was charged with kidnapping the adopted two-year-old child of Mrs. Eva Reissack, the charge being laid by the latter. Mrs. Reissack says that she adopted the youngster from its mother, now Mrs. Bellefeuille, a local lawyer drawing up the adoption papers. On Saturday evening last Mrs. Bellefeuille was at the Reissack home and during Mrs. Reissack's absence at the store according to the complainant's story, the child was taken away. On her return home Mrs. Reissack was frantic at the loss of her adopted child and at once informed the police. A warrant was sworn out, charging Mrs. Bellefeuille with kidnapping. On Sunday evening the police located Mrs. Bellefeuille, finding the child with her. Mrs. Bellefeuille maintains that she was given legal advice to the effect that the adoption was not regular and as she wanted her youngster she was entitled to take it herself, she thought. When the case came before Magistrate Atkinson this week he remanded it until next week. Mrs. Bellefeuille is out on bail, and the child is at the C.A.S. Shelter until the court decides as to who shall have the care and custody of the pretty little youngster.

At the same court one simple drunk was fined the proverbial ten and costs. Three motorists, one of them a woman were fined \$10.00 and costs each for speeding, while another lady paid \$10.00 and costs for driving a car without the necessary license.

Albert Bourassa faced a charge of soliciting orders for liquor. He was arrested by Constable Delves, of the Provincial force and Constable Lavolette, after it had reached the ears of the officers that he had secured liquor for others contrary to the Ontario Liquor License Act. A fine of \$100.00 and costs was placed on Bourassa for the offence.

Another man, E. Groulx, was fined \$100.00 for purchasing liquor without a permit.

A Moneta man faced a charge under the Excise Act. While a fire was in progress some days ago the source of the blaze could not be located in the regular cellar of the property and the man of the house strenuously denied that there was any other cellar. The firemen located another cellar and Constable Lavolette happened around and seeing the "mash" in the second cellar, decided to lay a charge. The case was remanded for a week.

Similar remand was granted in the case of a charge of assault against another man.

A. Delorme was charged with obtaining money under false pretences. The case was dismissed. The charge arose from some cheques said to be issued by Delorme, without there being sufficient funds to cover. Delorme had some money in another bank. The charge was dismissed.


