Gen. V. Williams, Chief Commissioner of the Provincial Police was in town to-day accompanied by Inspector Walter Moore. He told us, in an interview, which he kindly granted, that South Porcupine reminded him very much of a town in the west where he had been stationed in his younger days when on the Royal Mounted Police Force.

He stated that he thought the law and order evidenced here, where so many different nationalities were congregated, was remarkably good. He mentioned the provisions that are being made for patrolling the Ferguson highway. Under the supervision of Inspector Moore there are to be three stations for the provincial police in this special work on the highway; the first at Orillia, the second at Haileybury and the force looking after our own part will be stationed at Porcupine Junction.

The highway is to be patrolled by motorcycle. At each station there will be two first aid men available, one capable of giving first aid in case of personal injury and one to assist in repairing motors. All their officials along the highway are instructed to be polite, civil and do what they can to assist travellers on the highway. Asked what he thought of the idea some motorists had of trying to make speed records on the highway he stated this would not be tolerated, that it would not tend to the safety of the public and that officers patrolling the road would deal with such drivers in a manner that would tend to put a stop to all record-making

trips. He remarked on the splendid type of schools we have in the North. Gen. Williams impressed one as being a man of quiet but forceful character and one can understand the powerful influence he exerts as Chief Commissioner of the Provincial Police.
