While the whole world waited eagerly for news, Miss Amelia Earhart, Boston society girl, Wilmer Stultz, pilor, and Lou Gordon, mechanic, winged their way over the broad Atlantic Ocean from Newfoundland and landed safely near Llanelly, Wales. Flying the tri-motored hydro-monoplane "Friendship," these three intrepid fliers covered the 2,100-mile hop in 20 hours and 49 minutes. This is the first time in history that a woman has been successful in flying across the Atlantic. The above layout shows: top, left to right: Miss Earhart, Wilmer Stultz and Lou Gordon. Bottom left, is a picture of the plane leaving the water at Boston Habour en route to Newfoundland, while on the right is another photograph of Boston's "Lady Lindy," who according to observers resembles Col. Lindbergh.
