Many in Timmins heard with very deep regret last week of the death at his home in Ottawa of Mr. John T. McMahon, partner of Ben Hollinger at the time the latter staked the nowfamous Hollinger Mine. The late Mr. McMahon was for many years a resident of Haileybury and literally hundreds of people now in Timmins were well acquainted with him in the early days of the Cobalt camp and when the rush developed into Porcupine. The despatch from Ottawa on Friday telling of the death of Mc-Mahon said:

"John T. McMahon, former partner of Ben Hollinger, discoverer of the famous Hollinger Mine in Northern Ontario, died at Ottawa Civic hospital on Thursday morning at 1 o'clock, at the age of 50 years. He tor in Ontario and the west.

"Mr. McMahon was born at Crysneer on the Canadian Pacific Railway, Algoma Central and other lines, and later worked on the Crow's Nest Pass. He became interested in mining and was associated in business with the discoverer of the Hollinger Mine when the strike was made.

"For 17 years Mr. McMahon lived in Haileybury, Ont., moving to Ottawa in 1922 after he was burned out of home by the great fire of that year. About 20 years ago he retired from active business, but had been interested in mining up to quite recently.

"He is survived by his widow, for merly Miss Mary Jane Labine, of Westmeath, Ont., and by five sons, the eldest of whom is 18, Emmett, Vineent, Clement, Gerald and Clayton McMahon, all of Ottawa. Also surviving him are three brothers Edward and Dennis McMahon, of Rochester, N.Y., and two sisters, Mrs. Arthur Daley, and Mrs. Wm. Bain, both of Massena, N.Y.

"The funeral was held from the late residence, 620 Driveway, Ottawa, on Saturday morning. Solemn requiem high mass was celebrated at Blessed Sacrament Church and interment was at Notre Dame Cemetery."
