DEATH OF J. T. McMAHON PARTNER OF HOLLINGER

Man Who Helped Finance Benny
Hollinger When Prospecting
in the Porcupine.

Many in Timmins heard with very deep regret last week of the death at his home in Ottawa of Mr. John T. McMahon, partner of Ben Hollinger at the time the latter staked the now-famous Hollinger Mine. The late Mr. McMahon was for many years a resident of Haileybury and literally hundreds of people now in Timmins were well acquainted with him in the early days of the Cobalt camp and when the rush developed into Porcupine. The despatch from Ottawa on Friday telling of the death of McMahon said:—

"John T. McMahon, former partner of Ben Hollinger, discoverer of the famous Hollinger Mine in Northern Ontario, died at Ottawa Civic hospital on Thursday morning at 1 o'clock, at the age of 50 years. He was a pioneer railroader and prospector in Ontario and the west.

"Mr. McMahon was born at Crysler, Ont., where he was educated. He went into railroading, being an engineer on the Canadian Pacific Railway, Algoma Central and other lines, and later worked on the Crow's Nest Pass. He became interested in mining and was associated in business with the discoverer of the Hollinger Mine when the strike was made.

"For 17 years Mr. McMahon lived in Haileybury, Ont., moving to Ottawa in 1922 after he was burned out of home by the great fire of that year. About 20 years ago he retired from active business, but had been interested in mining up to quite recently.

"Mr. McMahon had had a slight ailment for some time, but it was not considered serious. He marched in the west end Corpus Christi procession last Sunday, and then was apparently well. On Monday morning at 1 o'clock, however, he suffered a severe heart attack.

"In his death the Knights of Columbus Ottawa Council lose a prominent fourth degree knight. He was also prominent in the Catholic Order of Foresters, and a devout member of the parish of Blessed Sacrament Church. During his six years' residence in Ottawa Mr. McMahon had made many friends, who will join his family in mourning him.

"He is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Mary Jane Labine, of Westmeath, Ont., and by five sons, the eldest of whom is 18, Emmett, Vincent, Clement, Gerald and Clayton McMahon, all of Ottawa. Also surviving him are three brothers Edward and Dennis McMahon, of Rochester, N.Y., and two sisters, Mrs. Arthur Daley, and Mrs. Wm. Bain, both of Massena, N.Y.

"The funeral was held from the late residence, 620 Driveway, Ottawa, on Saturday morning. Solemn requiem high mass was celebrated at Blessed Sacrament Church and interment was at Notre Dame Cemetery."

FORTY-ROOM HOTEL NOW PLANNED FOR SWASTIKA

New T. & N. O. Station Also Prob-
able. Swastika is "On the
Boom" at Present.

At the present time the town of Swastika is showing much growth and still more promise. Since Swastika has become the junction town on the main line of the T. & N. O. for Rouyn, as well as for Kirkland Lake and Larder Lake, the business of the town has greatly increased. There is also talk of a new T. & N. O. station being erected at Swastika at an early date as well as other construction works, including an extended waterworks system.

The latest evidence of the growth of Swastika is the fact that plans are now under way for the erection of a fine, new, modern hotel. Financial arrangements are understood to be under way at present for the establishment of a new company to be known as the Northern Ontario Hotels, Limited. One of the purposes of this company is to build and operate a hotel at Swastika. A fine site has been secured for the proposed new hotel, this site being adjacent to the T. & N. O. station. The plan is to build a 40-room hotel that will be modern in every respect. Mr. N. Servais, now of Buffalo, but formerly of Haileybury and of South Porcupine, and an expert in hotel management in this North Land, is promoting the new company and will be the manager of the new hotel when completed. It is understood that already a large proportion of the money necessary for the venture has been subscribed, many mining men being among those buying shares.
