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Shaft sinking now under way; mining plant, buildings and equipment are sufficient to sink to the 1,000 foot level.

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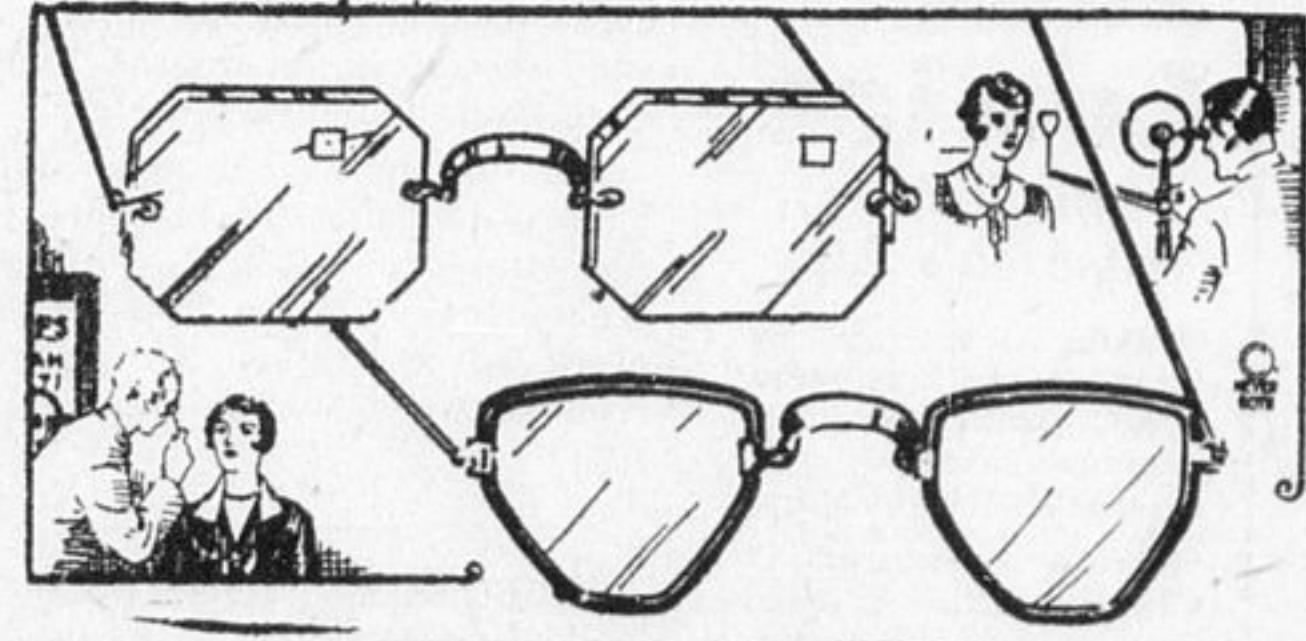
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STYLE IN GLASSES
