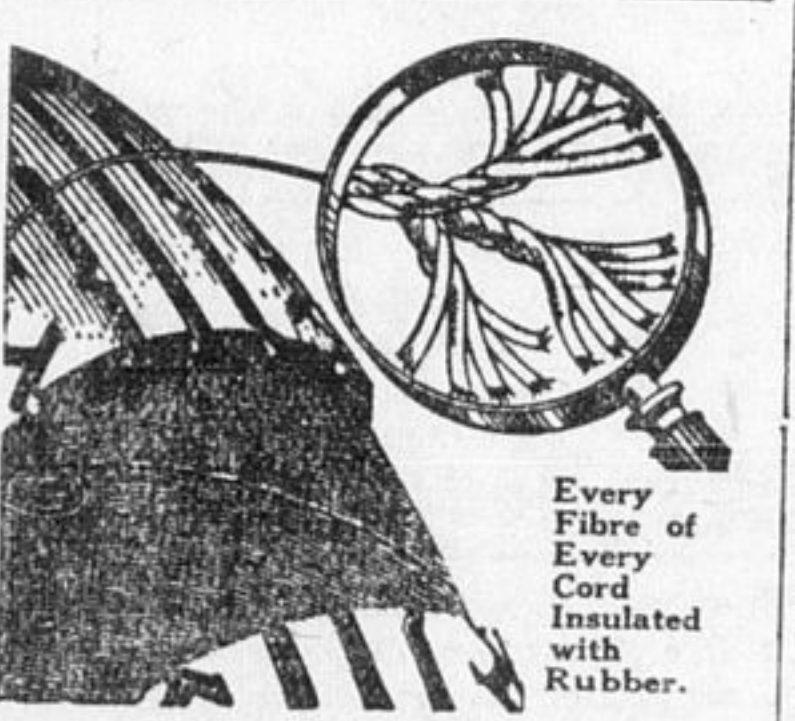

This meant that there would be no senior baseball for this season. This week there is better news for the baseball enthusiasts. There has been a re-organization and Timmins is once more represented in the Temiskaming League. This has necessitated a new schedule. WONDERFUL PROSPECTS OF
MARBANO MINES LIMITED

Consulting Engineer Gives Glowing Report on Property Fifty Miles East of Cochrane.

In referring to the prospects of the Marbano Mines, Limited, property about fifty miles east of Cochrane and about four miles north of the Transcontinental railway line, Mr. H. H. Hurst, mining engineer, of Haileybury, says:—"There are exceptionally promising conditions, favourable for copper, zinc, gold, silver and iron pyrites." The company owns 32 claims in Street township, and Mr. Hurst spent several days recently on surface inspection of the property. Mr. J. Matheson, of North Cobalt, discoverer of the property, was also at the claims at the same time.

Mr. Hurst found the orebody extending over two miles in length and one mile in width, quite apparently a continuation of the north western Quebec mineral zone, and also found the mineralization comparing favourably with the Katango deposits in South Africa, which he called a world-beater and on which millions of pounds sterling had been expended in developing.

A gang of men have been busy on the property for a year or so past, and a staff of 10 under a diamond drill contractor will go in immediately in addition. For this latter work supplies are now being forwarded. Three camps have been erected on the property and a comprehensive programme of exploration and development work has been mapped out. In commenting on the progress made by the property, The Cochrane North Land Post last week says:—"In short, the developments to be expected to take place will undoubtedly lead to a highly promising camp in close neighbourhood to the town of Cochrane and might be expected to give tremendous impetus to business here as there never has been seen anything to surpass the mineralization as well as the size of the deposit and the even distribution of the mineralization as both ends of the two-mile orebody show identically the same."

WORK ON PARMAC-PORCUPINE
PROCEEDING SATISFACTORILY

In a report made last week to the shareholders of the Parmac-Porcupine Mines, the manager Mr. A. M. Bilsky, says:—"I am pleased to inform you that I have just returned from the property of your Company at Timmins, Ontario where I arrived in Monday evening, accompanied by Dr. Ralph M. McKee, one of your directors, and also Mr. Douglas A. Mutch, our chief engineer."

"This visit was made for the purpose of inspecting the progress made by the diamond drill that is now operating on your property, and for consultation generally, looking to further development of the property."

"I am pleased to say that the drilling of No. 3 hole is progressing most satisfactorily, the drill having now penetrated some 420 feet into the rock formation, after having gone through about 140 feet of overburden. The cores show that the drill is in rock that is well mineralized, and it is the opinion of Mr. Mutch, concurred in by Dr. McKee and myself, that there will be important developments very shortly from this drill hole. Mr. Mutch is very confident that we will pick up the contact between the basalt and the porphyry, and because the conditions are so favourable and substantially identical with those prevailing on adjacent property, he feels that we should find excellent vein formation and that there is every reason to believe we should find mineralization which should make ore."

"The progress of the drill, since penetrating the rock after passing through the overburden, has been steady and uninterrupted and an excellent rate of progress has been maintained. If these conditions prevail, we should, very shortly, reach the objective."


