CORNISH MINER DIES AT DOME HOSPITAL MONDAY

**Marlyn Udy, Employed at March Mine
Passes Away. Pneumonia the
Cause of Death**

Marlyn Udy, a Cornish miner employed at the March Gold Mines, passed away on Monday at the Dome hospital from pneumonia. The late Mr. Udy was taken suddenly ill and the management of the March Gold Mines had him taken at once to the Dome Mines hospital where all possible was done for him but all efforts and skill proved unavailing. A particularly sad feature of the death is the fact that the late Mr. Udy is survived by a widow and three children in far-off Cornwall, to whom the death will come as a great shock, the unfortunate man being ill only a very brief time. Funeral arrangements were made by the March Gold Mines, interment being made yesterday (Wednesday).

The late Mr. Udy was a native of St. Colomb, Cornwall, England, and at the time of death he was about 45 years of age. He had been employed only since last May at the March Gold Mines, but the officials gave him all possible attention and care during his very brief illness, and all possible was done to save his life. The late Mr. Udy was highly regarded by all who knew him and his death has been a general sorrow to all. The deepest sympathy of all goes out at this time to the bereaved widow and children, and to all other relatives and near friends in this sad and sudden death.

RICH SPECIMENS FROM THE GRIMSTON CLAIMS

The Sudbury Star last week says: "Rich specimens of ore brought by Digby Grimston from his claims in Garrison township are reported to have caused considerable stir in Porcupine. Mr. Grimston has done a lot of work on the Garrison property in the last few years and friends are keenly interested in the news that at last he has made what appears to be an important strike. Garrison township is situated on the eastern extension of the Porcupine gold belt. Mr. Grimston reports that while sinking a small shaft on the property he ran into consistent values which further work showed to extend across the entire width of the shaft. The vein on which the work was being done has been traced for a distance of 300 feet."

CAR SMASHED LAST WEEK ON OLD T. & N.O. CROSSING


