We hear that a new general superintendent is arriving this week for the Dome Mines to take the place of Mr. C. W. Dowsett who is now in Africa. We believe the new man is coming most highly recommended from the Central Manitoba district.

A regular meeting of the Tisdale township council was held on Monday evening, June 26th, Reeve and Councillors Kerr and Laforest being present. After passing the minutes of previous meeting considerable correspondence was read. A large amount of it was re charity cases. Some of those cases which have been receiving help are to be dropped now as there are other cases coming up that are possibly more needful. There was a letter from the Railway re the culvert at Schumacher and the clerk was asked to write again explaining fully that their present culvert in its present condition was inadequate to carry off the water that came from the adjoining street and that this was its natural channel for its outlet. Petitions for roadwork to be done on Bartleman townsite were to be further looked into. A letter was read from an owner of property on Railroad street, South Porcupine, offering to tear the building down and remove it and transfer the lot to the township in consideration of the cancelling of

the present taxes on same. This matter was held over as it was thought that there were perhaps a number of others who would be willing to do the same thing and they could all be taken up at once. There was correspondence re the proper drainage area around the spring which is the source of the water supply but this is being well looked after for the present. A by-law was passed ratifying the making of a contract with Alex Grents, for the remodelling of the jail. Police Officer Craik was present and stated that the Provincial Government were giving a certain amount towards the installing of proper plumbing in the cells with which they presented the jail here awhile ago. Re roads, the engineer was told to get prices from various contractors after having made arrangements for obtaining rock for same. It was decided to buy the surface right to a claim which will be a central location for a dump when such is required. The routine accounts were passed for payment.

BE SURE TO BRING YOUR BILL WHEN PAYING TAXES

Only Official Receipt is Stamped on Tax Bill by New Machine to be Used

Tax bills will soon be out for the year now, and all ratepayers are particularly urged to note the necessity for taking their tax bills with them when paying their taxes this year. A new National Cash Register Tax Collection machine is being installed here to guard against any errors in tax collection monies and to simplify and assure the fullest accuracy. This machine prints and dates the official receipt for all payments made on taxes. Three copies of this official receipt are made by the machine. One of these copies is the official receipt torn off and given to the ratepayer. This is the only official receipt and so to secure this official receipt it is necessary that the tax bill be taken along when paying taxes. This applies to the second payment as well as to the first. To avoid all inconvenience to themselves and to the officials the ratepayers this year should make a special note of keeping their tax notices and turning them in when making payments. One copy of each receipt is stamped by the machine for the tax collection department, and the third copy is on a special roll in the machine under lock and key, for the use of the auditor only. The system is said to make mistakes practically impossible and to guard all concerned from loss due to errors.

A despatch last week from Cobalt says that the delivery rig which the deceased had driven in his former place of employment was used to carry the floral tributes to his memory when the Gusto Sebastiani was buried at Cobalt last week. The young man who was drowned in the Montreal river while fishing at Latchford, at one time worked in the store of Joseph Rava, Lang St. grocer, and the wagon with which he delivered goods to the homes of customers preceded the hearse bearing his remains to the Roman Catholic cemetery at Mileage 104. Requiem mass had been solemnized in St. Theresa's Church by Rev. Father Chapleau, and the cortege was one of the largest seen in Cobalt in years. The Italian colony was represented, and many citizens of other nationalities, who had known Gusto Sebastiani through their dealings with his one-time employer, and who held him in high esteem, attended the funeral service to pay their last respects.

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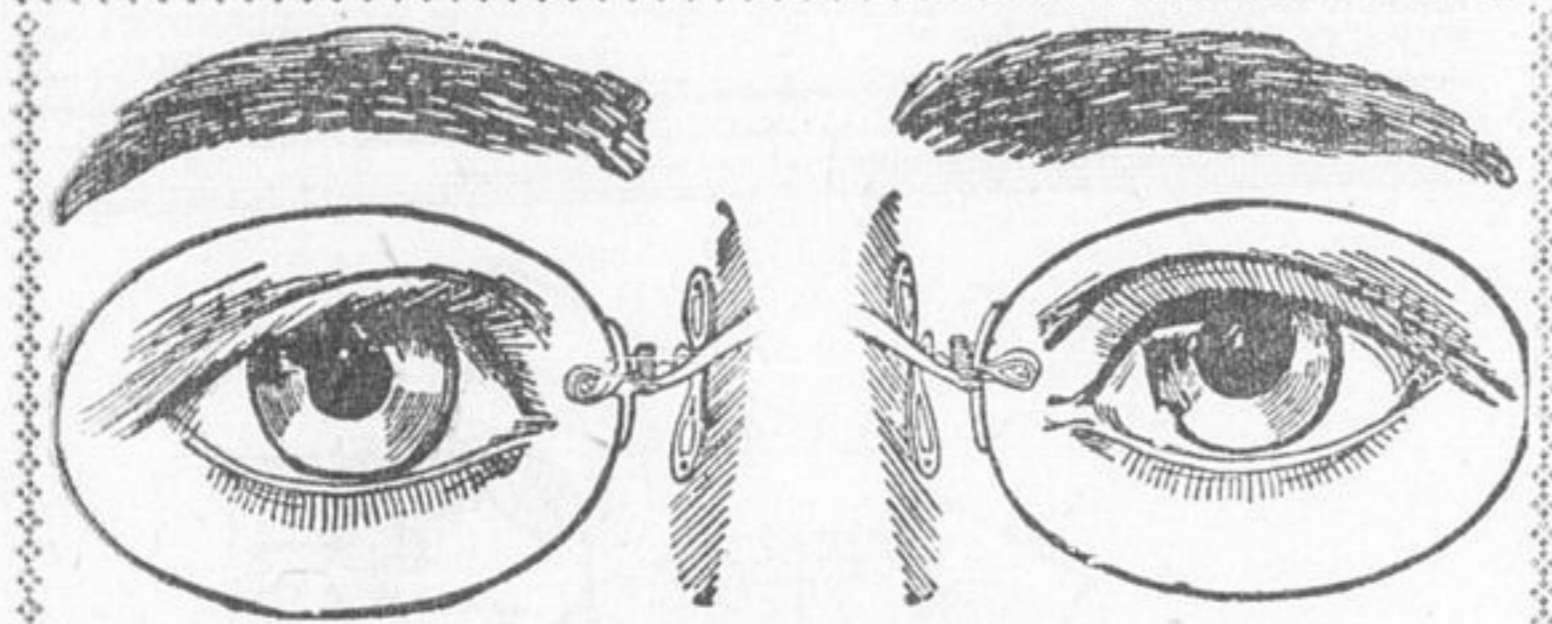
TRAIN SERVICE
