SYNDICATE SHARES TO BE EXCHANGED FOR HOWEY

Two Million Shares of Howey Gold Mines, Limited, to be Distributed to Unit Holders in Syndicate

The following letter, sent out by J. E. Hammell, chairman of the Howey Red Lake Gold Syndicate, to the unit holders of Howey Red Lake Gold Syndicate, is self-explanatory:—

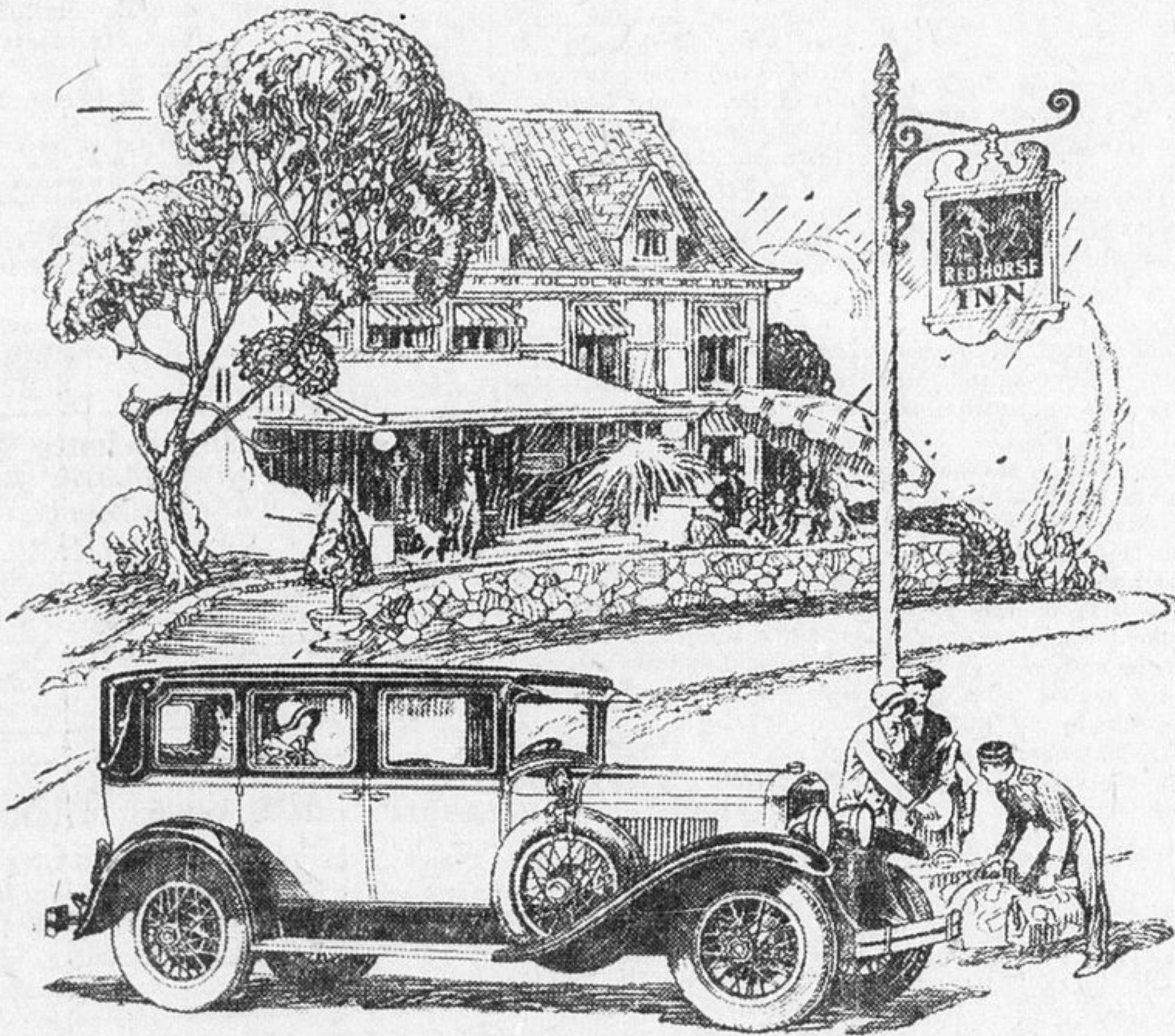
