Special to The Advance. On Friday night last about tenthirty the worst accident yet of the Timmins-South Porcupine highway occurred when a motor cycle and Whippet motor car collided. One woman, Mrs. Marina Ziglotte, who was riding in the side car of the motor cycle died in four minutes after being admitted to the hospital. She was terribly crushed and mangled from the impact. Her husband lies at the hospital here in a very precarious condition. On Sunday last his limbs which had been crushed, still in danger. He and the young woman who was killed were only married about three months ago. The other occupant of the motor cycle, Angelo Artuso, is also at the hospital but is recovering nicely. Mr. James Gibson, of South Porcupine, the occupant of the car, was knocked unconscious for a while but was taken home. He is in a very nervous condition from shock. In an interview with Mr. O. Knutson, manager of the Harris Consolidated Mines, we find rapid progress Principal of the Salvation Army is being made at this property, formerly known at the Beaumont Mines. A large station has been cut at the 600 foot level, also a very large sump to take care of water from there. The shaft is now 20 feet below the 600 level and they expect to reach the 750 foot level by August 1st, where there will then be another station cut. There will also be an 875 level and a 1,000 level. When the 1,000 reached the shaft will be widened to a three-compartment shaft to give another compartment for sinking shaft to a further depth of 500 ft. making a total depth of 1,500 foot There will be a hoist installed at the 1,000 foot level to do the hoisting for the 500 ft. to be sunk below 1,000 ft A large development programme has been planned. After this station at the 1,000 foot level has been completed new levels will be opened up and cross-cutting started to open up the ore bodies of the sought ore-zone. Preparations are being made for installing a return electric signal system in the mine.
