## CONDITIONS AT PARMAC PROGRESSING FAVORABLY

Mr. A. M. Bilsky, manager of the Parmac Porcupine Mines, Ltd., has sent to the shareholders the following wire received last week from Douglas A. Match, consulting engineer for the property: "I wired you last night to New York that the hole on Parmac was now down 610 feet, and that it showed good mineralization with graphite stringers. Just prior to reaching this depth the hole cut quartz stringers. The occurrence of both of the above is decidedly encouraging, and indicates that we are getting in the region of the Porphyry-Kewatin contact. I do not know at the present time of any occurrence of graphite in similar formation in Porcupine except in or close to an ore section. The same occurrence was quite pronounced at McIntyre at approximately the same horizon. I certainly consider the indications to be entirely favourable, and to be bearing out the theory on which I spotted the drilling. I trust that I will shortly be able to send you a further message to the effect that ore has been cut."

## WOMAN PROSPECTOR IN MANITOBA STARTS RUSH

Important Discovery Made by Miss Kathleen Rice Creates Big Interest Among Other Prospectors.

A rush of considerable importance resulted some days ago from a discovery made by a woman prospector, Miss Kathleen Rice, on the north-western shore of Lake Weskusko on Rice Island, 25 miles from steel on the Hudson Bay Railway in Northern Manitoba. The find is of copper and the samples are said to be remarkably rich. Miss Rice is the first woman to record a find of importance in the Manitoba field. She has spent several years in Manitoba and is well-known as a pioneer prospector and settler in the district four hundred miles north of Winnipeg.

Miss Rice is a native of St. Mary's, Ontario. She is a graduate of Toronto University, and dropped the easy chances for a successful career as a high school specialist in mathematics to take up a homestead in Manitoba's North Land and to engage in prospecting. She has trained her own dogs for travel by dog team in winter and is an expert with a canoe for summer travel. She has lived by herself on the homestead and also did much of her prospecting by herself. In her recent rich find, it is understood that another prospector has an interest in the discovery.

The police, both in Timmins and Schumacher, were busy last night on traffic cases, several charges eventuating for fast driving and other breaches of the highways act. ## ETON AND HARROW LADS TO VISIT TIMMINS SOON

Forty Boys in Party From Noted English Public Schools to be in Timmins, August 15th and 16th.

A party of some forty boys from the noted English public schools, such as Eton, Harrow, Winchester, etc., are this summer making a tour of Canada. Mr. Studholme, who has the arrangements in charge for the tour, was in Timmins recently, and the party will visit this town on the trip west. The visitors will reach here on August 15th, at about 8.30 p.m., and will remain here until 3 p.m., the following day, Thursday, August 16th. The trip is to be of an educational nature as well as an outing, and so an itinerary that will give a fair conception of the extent and variety of the country, its resources and industries, has been planned. As Timmins is the centre of the largest gold mining camp in Canada, a visit here was naturally considered essential. While here the young men will be shown the various phases of the gold mining industry, the big mines of the district kindly agreeing to see to this. The party will also be entertained at luncheon by the Timmins Kivans club, according to present plans. On account of the large extent of territory to be covered and the many things to be seen and studied, the arrangements necessarily have to be confined to a few representative towns, cities and sections. So far as known Timmins will be the only centre visited in this North, the visit here having to cover the gold mining industry and allied lines. At Ottawa the party will be the guests of the Governor-General during their visit to that city.

## SEVERAL LIQUOR CASES AT COURT HERE THIS WEEK.
