**SUDBURY EXPEDITION TO
THE HUDSON BAY AREA.**

Much has been heard recently about the alleged "race" between the Hammell and Lindsley interests respectively to get to the mineral riches of the Hudson Bay area. There is a third expedition financed by Sudbury men, told of by The Sudbury Star. In this connection The Star on Saturday says:—

"While press despatches have lavishly spread publicity over the departure this week of rival airplanes belonging to the Northern Aerial Mineral Exploration Company and the Lindsley mining interests respectively on mysterious missions connected with the exploration of Northern Canada's mineral resources, it was not generally known until yesterday that another expedition, financed by Sudbury interests, was already on its way in the race for one of the sub-Arctic prizes which it is believed is one of the objectives of the larger expeditions.

"The sponsors of the third expedition which left Sudbury two weeks ago to-day for Winnipeg are the Dastral Mining Syndicate. The expedition is composed of six men under the direction of W. W. Davis, president of the Syndicate, who is accompanied by another geologist whose identity has not been disclosed. The party left Winnipeg a week ago, Monday, for the Pas where it was their intention to divide, one section leaving by aeroplane for Norway House and the other division following by canoe with provisions and supplies. While the exact location of their destination is not revealed it is understood that the proposed route will take them more than 200 miles north of Norway House and somewhere in the neighbourhood of Hudson's Bay. Their objective is believed by the Syndicate to be the same as that of at least one of the expeditions in the race which left Ottawa early this week. Members of the party are armed with licenses and applications sufficient to allow them to acquire 30 claims.

**GOLD CENTRE PLANNING
EXTENSIVE DEVELOPMENT**

Geological Surveys Now Being Made. Work Will Be Planned on Results of Surveys.

Geological surveys are being taken at Gold Centre Porcupine Mines, it is announced from the Company's offices. Plans have been made for extensive development of this property and the work is to be in charge of competent engineers. Work will be undertaken as soon as the forthcoming report on the property is submitted to the Directors of the Company. Until they have the complete report before them, officials of the Company decline to even forecast the extent of the development work contemplated by them at this property. However, the engineer's report will be acted upon as soon as the recommendations are made known. It is definitely stated that surface work is to be undertaken but from reliable sources it is learned that the principal development work will consist of a thorough diamond drilling campaign to be started shortly. It is of interest to note that the Gold Centre Porcupine property is situated east of the Platt Vet claims and in close proximity to the Parmac property where important results are now being obtained in a diamond drilling campaign. Engineers who have examined the property report that porphyry intrusions have caused considerable shearing in which low values in gold have been recovered. Up to the present time no serious attempt has been made to develop the property. Late last year a new Company was formed called the Gold Centre Porcupine Mines Limited to acquire the assets of the Gold Centre Mines Limited. This was done with the idea in mind of raising funds for the development of the property. This has been carried out and the interests of the shareholders are being cared for by the new Board of directors elected at the time of the transfer of the old Company's assets to the new owners.

A recent regular meeting of the Port Arthur city council occupied only six minutes of time by the watch. **AMENDS THE WORKING OF
THE BIRTH CERTIFICATE**

The principal of the Cobalt High School has been receiving considerable publicity due to the fact that he took it upon himself to amend the wording of the birth certificate of his daughter. If publicity were his idea, he no doubt accomplished what he set out to do. It was his first time to fill out a birth certificate in official way, so it is only natural, perhaps, that he should know better what the authorities want than the authorities themselves. There is, however, another point that seems to have been overlooked by the Cobalt educationalist. That is, the tendency of so many nowadays to take it upon themselves to amend any laws or regulations they may not care about. There is a proper way to agitate for a change in existing laws and regulations. It is too true that the modern form of protest inclines too much to disregard of the law rather than the slower plan of having the law amended. It is to be hoped, however, that the Cobalt teacher is not starting any bootlegging birth registration. Even those who agree with him as to "Canadian" expressing a distinct race or nationality, will hesitate, after considering the matter, to follow his plan of amending the birth certificates. No doubt what the department requires is statistics regarding racial descent, in which case "Canadian" is as meaningless as "North American" would be. No one would have been surprised if the amended form had been made by one of the principal's pupils. In recording the nationality, the Cobalt principal is quoted as adding the note—"The term Canadian should be used, as it expresses a race in this case, since both parents are of the origin underlined above. Mr. Clarry was born in Locust Hill, and Mrs. Clarry, in Guelph, and are defined as 'Canadian' in racial origin."

It is worth noting in passing that many loyal Canadians—Canadians who are proud enough of Canada to risk their lives for this Dominion—still remember with pride their British origin and their present British loyalty. They are loyal to Ontario—to the North Land—to their community,—but they do not forget that they are British and that there is no cause to be ashamed of this.
