Nominations took place on Monday last for a councillor to fill the place of D. The sad news came to town this afternoon in a telegram received by Mr. E. Davis, telling of the death by drowning of Mr. Bob Robertson, his son-in-law, at Beaver Lake in

Saskatchewan on Saturday last. The telegram was sent from The Pas, Manitoba. Mr. Robertson is a nephew of Mrs. John Fell and came out to Canada six years ago when she and her son, Jim, were returning from a visit to Scotland. He is an only son, his parents and three sisters surviving him. Last January he was married to Neva, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Davis, of Pottsville, who was residing in Winnipeg while he was out on an exploration trip for the Dixon Mining Company in the vicinity of The Pas, Manitoba. They resided at the Central Manitoba for some time after their marriage. The late Mr. Robertson was a fourth year student in medicine at Glasgow University before joining the Scots Guards regiment. On obtaining his release from the latter he came to Canada and was employed first in the Dome mill, later at the Ankerite and March Mines, South Porcupine, then at the Teek Hughes, Kirkland Lake, from which he went to the Central Manitoba. The telegram was from a representative of the Dixon Mines and stated the body was being brought to Porcupine for burial. The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes out to the sorrowing young wife, and the parents and sisters. Mrs. Percy Andrews is a cousin of the deceased. No further particulars of the accident have been received at time of writing. A cablegram has been sent to the parents in Scotland.

HANDSOME TROPHY FROM KIRKLAND LAKE DONOR

N.O.F.A. Meeting Expresses Appreciation of Gift from Mr. Burns. Other N.O.F.A. Business

The N.O.F.A. held a general meeting in the Dome school house on Saturday evening. Among the items of business before the delegates was the protest of the Holly Rees against the Dome team in the Dickson cup series, it being held that the Dome had played a man who had not been signed the required number of days. It was explained that there had been a misunderstanding in the matter, and the Holly Rees, withdrew the protest.

Arrangements were made for the Ontario Cup games; for the Foster and King Cup competitions, these cups being N.O.F.A. trophies. The same elimination games will be held with home and home matches with Kirkland Lake winners and Porcupine district winners.

The entry fees for the Foster, King and Burns cups were reduced, with the expectation that all affiliated clubs of the N.O.F.A. will enter in these competitions.
