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PARTICULARS OF DEATH OF ROBERT ROBERTSON

Former Resident of This District Drowned in Manitoba on August 4th.

Reference was made last week by The South Porcupine correspondent of The Advance to the sad death by drowning of Robert Robertson in Manitoba. The late Mr. Robertson was a nephew of Mr. John Fell, of the Dome, and was well-known in this camp. He worked here at the Dome, Ankerite and other mines, and was married early this year to a young lady whose parents are esteemed residents of Porcupine. While Mr. Robertson was in the northerly part of Manitoba, his wife was staying with her parents in this camp. The Pas Herald, of The Pas, Manitoba, last week gave the following particulars in regard to the sad death:—

"On Saturday last, a man named Robert Robertson, in the employ of the Dixon Mines Limited, was accidentally drowned while bathing in Beaver Lake.

Robertson, with a few companions working on the Waverly group at Beaver Lake went in swimming last Saturday afternoon. None of them were expert swimmers but Robertson was only learning. They were bathing on a reef and Robertson appears to have slipped into deep water. He went under and never came up again. His companions could do nothing to save him but one of them ran to a near-by camp and brought a good swimmer. After two hours of diving and searching the body was located and brought ashore. Everything possible was done to restore life without avail. The men worked over him for hours but were finally forced to admit that life was extinct.

"Two of the men were sent on with the body in a canoe over the stormy lake, and reached Sturgeon Landing in a day and a night, coming via Sturgeon Weir. They reported to the R.C.M.P. at Sturgeon Landing and decided to bring the body on to town, feeling sure that the company would stand the expense. They overtook Mr. Dixon, who had left the property the day before, at The Barrier and immediately on arrival in town he wired Robertson's wife in Winnipeg and asked for instructions. Mr. Dixon accompanied the remains to Winnipeg and the body will be shipped to South Porcupine for interment.

"The deceased was a young man about 25 years of age and leaves a wife to mourn his loss. He was very popular with his fellow employees and they were greatly distressed over the accident. Robertson had just arranged to bring his wife up to Beaver Lake and Mr. Dixon was carrying the letter back to The Pas to mail when overtaken by the party."

MAN NOW DROWNED LIVED FOR A TIME IN TIMMINS

Ludger Jacques Worked Here for Time, But Had No Relatives in Town. Was Drowned Last Week at Temagami.

A despatch this week from Cobalt says that a man believed to be Ludger Jacques has been drowned in mysterious circumstances and provincial constable McClelland with the assistance of Joseph Claveau, companion of the dead man is searching for the body. The tragedy took place at Narod Lodge, 11 miles from Temagami Station and Claveau admits both men had been drinking and that he fell asleep in the canoe after Jacques disappeared and did not awaken until the provincial officer arrived more than two hours later.

According to Claveau who is a guide at Bear Island he met Jacques for the first time on the train between Cobalt and Temagami and he says he told the latter he could get him a job. Each had a bottle of beer on the train Claveau declares, and subsequently after starting up the lake in an out-board motor canoe, opened one of a dozen bottles of whiskey and drank most of the contents. Later the engine stalled and it was while Claveau was trying to start it again that his companion disappeared from the canoe, the liquor going overboard at the same time.

The accident happened late Thursday night although definite word was not received here until Saturday when the constable and Claveau came to provincial police headquarters. Claveau says he shouted after the missing Jacques and he thinks a motor boat approached fairly close to his canoe but he remembers nothing more until Constable McClelland came along at midnight. The case of whiskey containing nine full bottles floated ashore and was recovered but there has been no sign of Jacques. The missing man is about 30 years old and is thought to have been working near Timmins and had a card from Ottawa Civic Hospital on which the name Jacques Fortier was written.

Chief L. MacLachlan, of Timmins, this week received an enquiry in the matter from the provincial police, and gathered all the information that could be secured here. Ludger Jacques lived here for a time with Mr. Ed. Lebrun, 117 Main street. Letters he had here showed that he was engaged to be married to a young lady in Courteral, Quebec. So far as can be learned he had no relatives here and was not very well-known in town. Those who knew him spoke well of him. It is understood that his relatives live near Montreal, Que.

NEWSPRINT INTERESTS AND HEARST FIGHT OFF

It is announced that as a result of negotiations held in Montreal last week a settlement has been reached of the outstanding differences between the Hearst group of newspapers and the newsprint manufacturers associated with Canadian Paper Sales Limited. The various suits and counter suits pending before the courts in the United States and Canada have been withdrawn.

In connection with the differences an action for \$978,630.35 was taken at Montreal by the Canadian Paper Sales Limited against the Newspaper and Magazine Paper Corporation of New York, and William Randolph Hearst, owner of a string of United States daily newspapers, as an amount owing for newsprint paper.
