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
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NO RACE ON FOR THE FAR NORTH, SAYS HAMMELL

President of N.A.M.E. Says Hudson Bay Area is Big Enough for All Exploring Area.

In an interview with The Northern Miner recently Mr. Jack Hammell, president of the Northern Aerial Minerals Exploration Co., treated with amusement the story told by several DeHaviland moth. of the daily newspapers that there was a race on beween exploration companies to get into the Hudson Bay area He stated emphatically that there was no thought of any such race, so far as the N.A.M.E. was concerned as the Hudson Bay area was large enough for everybody.

"My instructions to my men, in all parts of Canada, is to give as much assistance as possible to any other par ies seeking minerals in the northwest erritory," said Mr. Hammell.

"We are not gumshoeing. Anything we may find will be announced to the world. The territory we are heading for is 50 times or more as large as Ontario's mining areas and there is plenty of room for as many parties as want to go there,
