CARPENTER FALLS TO DEATH AT IROQUOIS FALLS FRIDAY

The following is from the last issue of The Broke Hustler, of Iroquois Falls:—
As he attempted to swing himself feet foremost through a portion of the concrete form being built in connection with the new digester, Palma Hotte, age 35 years, a carpenter on construction fell to his death, a distance of approximately fifty feet, last Friday morning at 9.30 a.m.
Although two workmen, who had been working with Hotte were near neither of them were clear as to what caused the unfortunate man to fall. It appears he either missed his hold or slipped. He landed on a platform some thirty feet below where the men were working and rolling off this struck head first on a steel girder. When workmen reached his side he was beyond any help.
Hotte who started work here on the 16th of July was a married man, residing at Cochrane and leaves a widow and five children to mourn his unfortunate end. Mr. L. P. Pharrand of the Wet Room, is a brother-in-law and accompanied the body, which was shipped to Cochrane.
The accident was very unfortunate and the first of any consequences on this work. No blame could possibly be attached to anybody.
