FEAR THAT ANOTHER HEAVY FLOOD MAY VISIT NORTH

The New Liskeard Speaker last week said:—"Already representation is being made to both the Dominion and Ontario Governments as to flood conditions in the North Country, that is that section of Ontario lying north of the French River, and along the basin of the Ottawa River, Temiskaming Lake, Quinze Lake and tributary waters. It has been pointed out that never in the history of the north has there been so much water in the bush at, this time of the year. Should the weather tighten up this water will be more or less held in the small streams and lakes during the winter, with the result that an extra quantity will have to be taken care of next spring. The Governments are being urged to take time by the forelock and take such action as will allow this extra quantity of water to pass down to the ocean before the next season comes along. Conservation is all right, but conservation which floods one part of the country for the benefit of another is far from being desirable."




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IF YOU LEAVE NO WILL


