T. & N. O. TO HELP SETTLERS BY BUYING RAILROAD TIES

Railway Will Spend \$75,000 or More. First of Plans to Aid Settlers This Winter.

In referring last week to the fact that Premier G. Howard Ferguson was personally interested in finding plans to aid the settlers in this North Land who have been so burdened this year through inability to save their crops on account of the continuous rain. The Advance, perhaps left the impression that with the premier so interested something would surely be done. This was the impression intended to be given to readers, and it is justified by this week news. The first move of Premier Ferguson to assist the settlers not by way of any charity or donations, but by providing work and means of making an honest dollar during the winter, was made on Monday when the premier asked Mr. Geo. W. Lee, chairman of the T. & N. O. Railway Commission, to arrange for the purchase of further railroad ties from the settlers of the North. It is understood that between \$75,000 and \$100,000 will be spent for ties this winter, this money going into the hands of the settlers who certainly need it. The T. & N. O. it is said will buy direct from the settlers paying 80 cents per tie at the track. The settlers will not have to load the ties but simply lay them down at the tracks at certain specified places. This good work is to commence at once. Despatches from Toronto this week say that a very large area will be covered in order that as many individual settlers as possible may benefit by the work and money thus provided. For the settlers with tie timber on their lands, or who can otherwise take part in the plan, this scheme is a very pleasing one, meaning a way to earn needed money and thus helping them out without any charity—charity being one of the things that the good settlers do not want. All they ask is a chance to get along. In discussing the tie-buying plan at Toronto this week Premier Ferguson said:—"We have ample supplies of ties at the present time, but, notwithstanding, we are prepared to help out the settlers at this time. We trust that the plan we are putting into operation will be of material assistance to them."

While this tie-purchasing scheme will be of great benefit while not in any way wasting money, it will not meet the situation fully. There will still be settlers hard hit by the rainy season that has so injured the North who will have no ties to sell. Accordingly it is to be hoped that Premier Ferguson will continue to give his best attention to seeking ways and means to help the settlers in other ways than by the railroad tie methods. One of the best methods to assist the settlers for the present and to help the country for the future is in work that will result in more and better roads for the North. Roadwork should be made one

OVER THIRTY DECORATED ARMISTICE WINDOWS HERE

Possession of A. J. Shragge Cup for the Year Goes to the Stewart Company for Elegant Design

To encourage the sale of the wreaths made by the disabled soldiers and to increase the number of windows decorated for Armistice Day, A. J. Each one of these windows was viewed and studied and after many hours of inspection and consideration of the different designs and effects, the judges reported as follows to the Ladies' Auxiliary:—"We your committee, appointed to judge the Armistice Day windows in Timmins and district, have decided that the honour of winning the cup for the year goes to the design in the Stewart Company Store window. We did the judging on a point system, the points considered being:—originality, design, thoroughness of detail, art, patriotism, and message conveyed. We would like to mention specially the remarkably clever and striking window of the Goldfield Drug Store (Col. Scobell's), and the able appeal on behalf of Poppy Day so effectively made by the Hollinger Dry Goods Store window. Only a point or two in the totals separated the three windows mentioned. Your organization and the merchants of the town are to be very sincerely congratulated upon the number, quality and ability shown by the windows dressed for this occasion. The committee viewed 33 windows with wreaths and special designs in Timmins and Schumacher."

In addition to the three windows mentioned, the judges were specially pleased with the artistic windows of Frank Ellies, Taylor Hardware, Marshall-Eccleston, D. Ostrosser & Co., and Moisiey & Ball. The Hulme Sign Co. and Jos. Weston gave valuable assistance in the designing and decorating of some of the windows, the winning window in part being the artistic work of the Hulme Sign Co. The de-

corated windows proved a source of pleasure to the crowds on Saturday. The lighting system at the Frank Ellies window made it very attractive at night. The A. J. Shragge window was attractive, but was not considered in the contest, as the cup was donated by the firm. Special mention may be made of the Marshall-Eccleston, D.
