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**South Porcupine Jury Give Verdict in Accident Case**

**Inquest Into Death of Mrs. Zigoletto, of Timmins, Concluded at South Porcupine. Deep Sorrow at South Porcupine at Death of Mr. H. M. Martin. Other Items of News from Correspondent at South Porcupine.**

South Porcupine, Nov. 13th, 1928. Special to The Advance.

Dr. Kinsman, president of Porcupine Hockey Club, and Mr. W. G. Bowles, secretary, attended the annual meeting of the N.O.H.A. at North Bay, last Saturday. The people of this part of the camp are much pleased to see the name of Mr. Charlie Roach, of Timmins, on the new executive, and feel that, so far as he is concerned, fair play and good sportsmanship will be upheld at every turn.

Mr. Stan. Burgoyne, the noted hockey coach, whom Porcupine Hockey Club have secured for the coming season, arrived in town on Sunday evening.

Mrs. J. Marley, of Cochrane, (nee Beryl Childs) was a visitor at her parental home here over the week-end holiday.

There was a light police court on Thursday last; one man for having liquor in a public place was fined one hundred dollars and costs; two drunks paid the usual \$10 and costs, and two were fined \$25 and costs for not reporting on their income tax.

The adjourned inquest into the death of Mrs. Marina Nigoletto was resumed on Friday last when Angelo Artuso who has been under treatment at the Toronto General Hospital was present and gave his evidence. He was the driver of the motor cycle on the night of the fatality. Much of his evidence corroborated that of Lorenzo Zigoletto, husband of the deceased woman. From the time he saw the car like a flash in front of him until the next day in the hospital he declared he knew nothing clearly. He stated he had owned the motor cycle for a year last August and had driven a motor cycle for two years and a half. After nearly four hours deliberation the jury brought in the following verdict:—"We, your jury summoned here to inquire into the death of one Marina Zigoletto, find the said Marina Zigoletto came to her death on July 5th, 1928, from injuries received while riding in the side-car of a motor cycle, driven by one Angelo Artuso of the town of Timmins, as the result of a collision on the Timmins-Porcupine highway on the night of July 5th between said motor cycle and a motor car driven by one James E. Gibson of the village of South Porcupine. From the evidence, which is very conflicting and our knowledge of the condition of the highway at the time of and in the vicinity of said collision, and the present condition of said motor cycle and motor car and the evidence as to their respective positions immediately after the aforesaid collision, we, your jury, have come to the unanimous conclusion that the motorcycle going in a westerly direction was travelling immediately prior to the collision on the south side of the highway." Mr. McColeman of North Bay represented the Italians at the inquest while Mr. Gauthier represented Mr. James Gibson, driver of the motor car.

At a meeting of the Curling Club held the latter part of October the fees for the year were fixed at fifteen dollars per year. Mr. F. C. Evans was elected as president. The vice-presidents elected were: first, Chief McInnis; second, Mr. W. D. Pearce. Secretary-treasurer, A. D. Pearce. The executive is composed of Alex. Fulton (Schumacher), A. Stevenson (Dome), Dr. McLaren, W. Fairhurst, S. Kennedy and S. Sky, South Porcupine. The auditors are Dan MacLellan and Maxwell Smith. Sr. Mr. George Cole, the retiring president, was presented with an address and a suit case prior to his departure to Manitoba as Chief Inspector of Mines. It is proposed to hold a dance on November 30th.

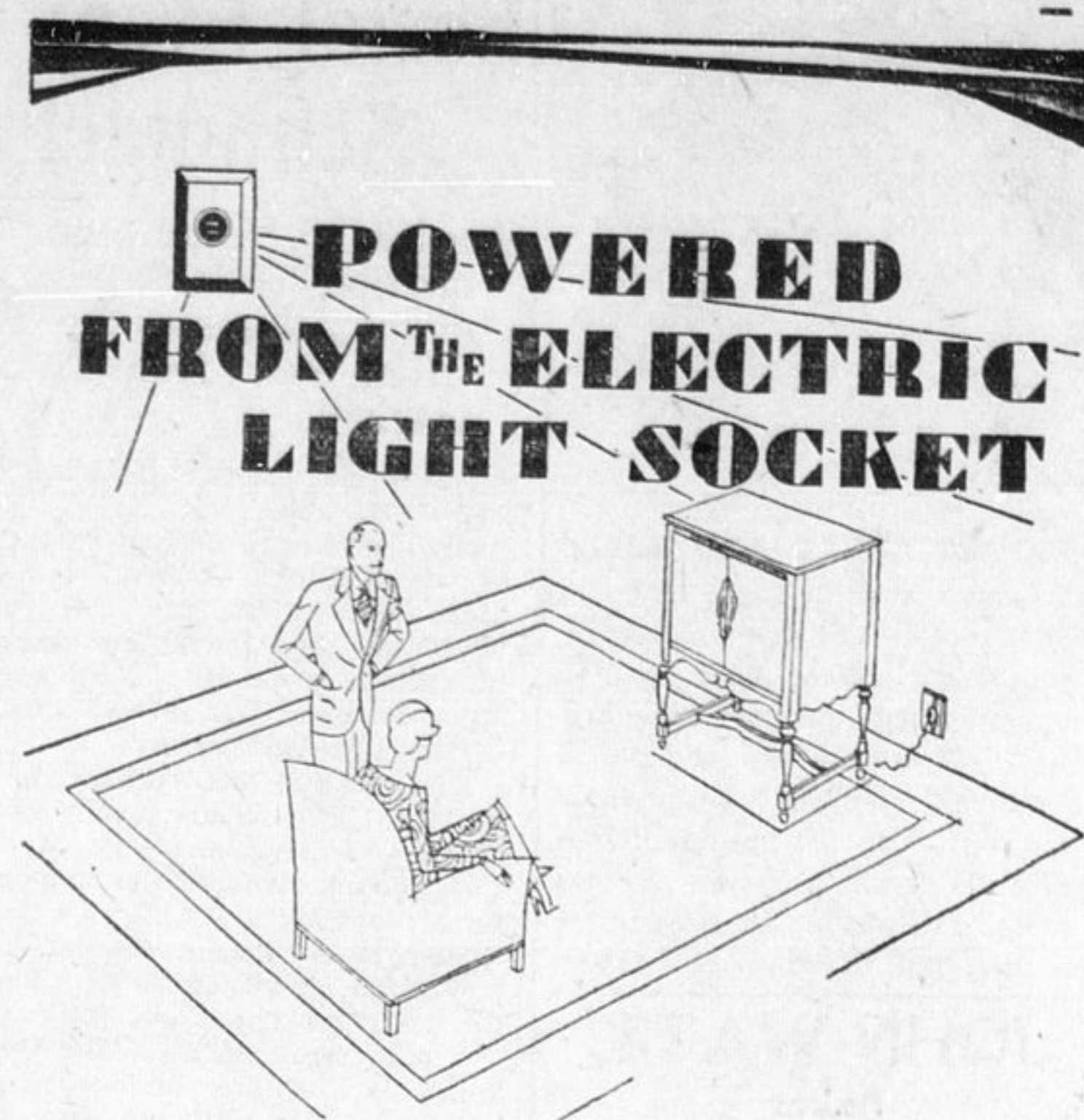

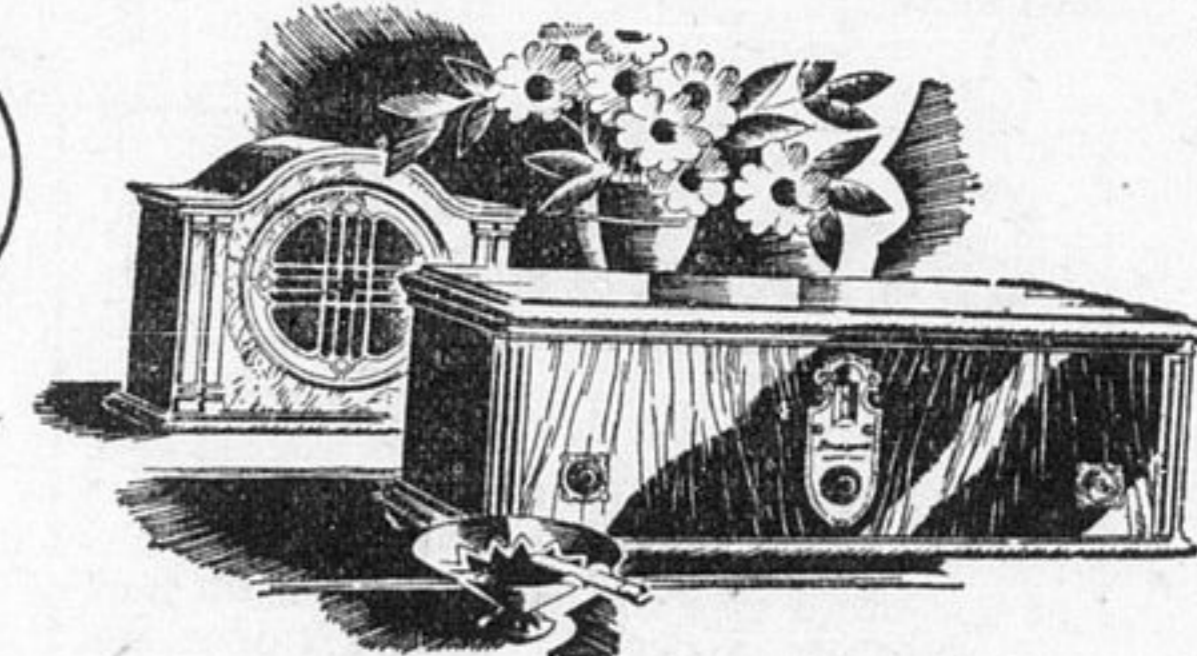
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**By-Law No. 19**

A By-law of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins in the District of Cochrane to raise by way of loan the sum of \$17,000 for the purpose herein mentioned.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins in the District of Cochrane require to borrow the sum of \$17,000.00 to raise funds for the purpose of building an addition to, equipping and providing further accommodation at the Separate Schools in the Town of Timmins and for such purpose to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of Five (5) per cent. per annum which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in yearly sums during the period of Thirty years, of such amounts respectively that the aggregate amount payable for the principal and interest in any year shall be equal as nearly as may be to the amount so payable for principal and interest in each of the other years.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise annually the sum of \$1,105.88 during the period of Thirty years to pay for the said yearly sums of principal and interest as they become due.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property rateable for Separate School purposes in the said Town of Timmins according to the last revised assessment roll is \$2,491,855.77.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins is \$202,178.20 and no part of the principal or interest is in arrears.

NOW THEREFORE the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins Enacts as follows:—

1. That for the purpose aforesaid there shall be borrowed the sum of \$17,000.00 and debentures shall be issued therefor in sums of not less than \$100.00 each, bearing interest at the rate of Five per cent per annum and having coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest.

2. The debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within one year from the date on which this By-law is passed and may bear any date within such year and shall be payable in Thirty annual instalments during the Thirty years next after the time when the same are issued and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of the said years shall be as set forth in Schedule "A" which is hereby declared to be and form a part of this By-law.

3. The debentures as to both principal and interest may be expressed in Canadian currency and may be payable at any branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in the City of

Toronto and the Town of Timmins in the Province of Ontario.

4. The Chairman and Secretary of the said Board shall sign and issue the said debentures, and the debentures shall be sealed with the corporate Seal of the said Board. The interest coupons attached to the debentures shall be signed by the said Chairman and Secretary, and their signature to them may be written, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

5. During the Thirty years, the currency of the debentures, the sum of \$1,105.88 shall be levied and collected annually by a special rate sufficient therefor, over and above all other rates in the same manner and from the like persons and property, by, from upon or out of which other Separate School rates are levied, raised and collected for the said Thirty years.

6. The said sum of \$17,000.00 so borrowed and interest thereon and the said debentures shall be and the same are hereby made a charge upon the schoolhouse property and premises and on the real and personal property vested in the said Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins, and upon all the Separate School rates of the said Board to be hereinafter imposed until the said debentures and each and every of them together with all interest thereon shall have been fully paid and satisfied.

7. The said Debentures may contain any clause providing for registration thereof authorized by any Statute relating to Municipal debentures in force at the time of the issue thereof.

FINALLY PASSED this 5th day of November, A.D. 1928.
