South Porcupine I. O. O. F. Observe 14th Anniversary

Reminiscences of the Early Days of the Oddfellows' Lodge in the Camp. Charter Members of Porcupine Lodge I.O.O.F. Official Visit of Mrs. Horace Parsons, Organizing Secretary Girl Guides, to South Porcupine.

On Monday evening, November 19th, the Oddfellows of South Porcupine celebrated their fourteenth birthday by having a banquet with an impromptu concert and short dance afterward. A number of guests were present from Timmins. Mrs. H. M. Martin catered for the banquet, and was assisted in the serving of it by members of the Rebekah Lodge. After the repast was enjoyed a number of toasts were given, with Mr. Harry Costain acting as toast-master. After the toast to the King, Mr. W. G. Smith, of Timmins, proposed the toast to the Lodge and told several amusing stories. This toast was responded to by Mr. W. M. White, of Timmins, fondly called "Dad" by the majority in South Porcupine. He told of talking of Oddfellowship in camp 15 years ago, of petitioning for a lodge before the Grand Lodge thought the time opportune, then petitioning again and the lodge being instituted on November 18th, 1914. The charter members of the Lodge at that time were Messrs George Lake, Hugh and James Boyle, J. Easton and Cecil Culbert besides himself. Those present at the institution of that Lodge who were also present at the banquet on Monday were Messrs W. G. Smith, Geo. Lake, J. T. Easton, "Scotty" Wilson and W. M. White (now of Timmins) and J. Fell, Sr., R. McWilliams, Sr., W. G. Skinner, S. Sky, F. H. Hall, J. Ostrom and George Bartie, still belonging to this end of the camp. The lodges of Cobalt, New Liskeard and Haileybury put on the degree work, among those helping being the late S. A. Starling, father of George Starling, one of South Porcupine's most useful and active Oddfellows. Jack Easton was called on for a song and responded with "O, You Cobalt," the members of the party joining in the chorus. R. McWilliams then favoured the gathering with a cornet solo. L. Sauder proposed the toast to the Visitors, Maxwell Smith responding, who is a member of Espanola Lodge, though an attendant here for the past twelve years. H. Costain then gave an Irish version of the story of David and Goliath, the brogue in which would lead one to consider he had been born on the Emerald Isle had we not known the place of his nativity was a distance farther on, viz., the Isle of Man. "Scotty" Wilson then gave a rendition of the "Porcupine Song," with the others joining in. Mr. S. T. Walker, of Timmins, was called on for his favourite song but made a short speech. Then the whole group gathered around the piano informally or talking in social groups. The same

building in which the affair was held was obtained for the institution fourteen years ago and by the personal efforts of many of the members then was fitted up for a lodge room, special mention being made of the efforts of the late Brother William Richardson. During the reading of the names of the brothers who had passed on there were many who had built the lodge to what it is to-day and their successors are endeavouring to carry on to the best of their ability.

On Wednesday, November 14th, Mrs. Horace Parsons of Toronto, was an official visitor to the First South Porcupine Girl Guides. Mrs. Parsons is the organizing secretary for the Canadian Girl Guides, and has had a number of years work in the move-

ment, having been Commissioner for North Toronto, for some time. Mrs. W. H. Johns, secretary of the local association of Guides, has been appointed Divisional Commissioner, Timmins, Schumacher, South Porcupine and Connaught coming within her jurisdiction. It is the aim of the local association to form a company in Schumacher in the near future, possibly one in Connaught, and a second company in South Porcupine. Timmins Guides, with their captain, Mrs. Groves, were present at the meeting in Guide Headquarters in the evening, and Mrs. Parsons enrolled four of their members. Five South Porcupine girls and the three ladies who form our local association, were also enrolled. Mrs. Parsons spoke to the Guides about the influence that Guiding has on international relations, it being such a world-wide movement. She also expressed surprise that we had such a large and enthusiastic company after being organized so short a time.

Mrs. A. V. Waters, of Cochrane, has been appointed Commissioner for the District of Cochrane, and we hope, that with such a well-organized association, we will be able to have a camp for the entire district at Nellie Lake next summer, but that, of course, is a thing

of the future. Following the Guide meeting, the South Porcupine Court of Honour served tea, Mrs. Parsons later going to Timmins with Mrs. Groves, and leaving on Thursday morning for Iroquois Falls.
