

# Kiwanis Club Hear Details of Telephone System Here

Mr. C. N. Alston, Local Manager of Telephone Co., Explains Difficulties of Recent Transfer of Central Switchboard to New Building and Other Details of Service to the Public by the Northern Telephone Company.

There was a good turnout of members at the luncheon of the Kiwanis Club, on Monday afternoon, and all present thoroughly enjoyed the meeting which was full of interest and information.

The only visitor for the day was Mr. Hugh McEwan, of New Liskeard, who gave a message from the New Liskeard Kiwanis to the local club. He referred to the appreciation felt by the New Liskeard Club for the number from

Timmins who had attended the New Liskeard Club's Charter Night. That had been an auspicious occasion, and all had gone well with the New Liskeard Club since that fine start.

The speaker for the day on Monday was Mr. C. N. Alston, local manager for the Northern Telephone Co. The address by Mr. Alston explained much to the members of the club present, and all had a more sympathetic view on the telephone company after hearing the details of recent operations by the company.

Mr. Alston dealt at length with the service here and the company's endeavour to give the public the best service possible. He referred to the necessity recently for switching connections twice on the whole service in connection with the changing of central into the new Power Co. building. This was a piece of work that presented very considerable difficulty and if the public fully realized the trouble in such work they would not be too hard on the telephone company for any little derelictions in service.

Indeed, the wonder is that there was not more dislocation of service under all the difficulties of the situation. Last Wednesday night at 12 midnight the company finally switched over completely to the new building with no interruption to the service, except a very few local phones. To facilitate the switching over to the new building, two expert electrical engineers from the Northern Electric Co. had been here and had given their valuable services and talent to the work.

Mr. Alston explained that there were 1145 double connections that had to be made at each of the moves. There were 58 soldered connections in the installation of every telephone, he said. Mr. Alston described in detail the many different operations necessary in every telephone call from the time the receiver was lifted off the hook until the call was completed.

Mr. Alston's address was particularly interesting, but his answers to questions were even more informative. He answered a large number of pointed questions, in each case giving the information desired in very effective and satisfactory way. The questions drew out a great deal of very helpful information, the answers giving the members of the club a new idea of the extent and the difficulties of the telephone service and the effort made to provide adequate accommodation to the public.

In reference to long distance service to Toronto, Mr. Alston pointed out that the local company had no control over this, the long distance lines to North Bay being owned by the T. & N. O. Railway. There were only two trunk lines to North Bay, and the Northern Telephone Co. had been urging on the T. & N. O. Railway the desirability and necessity for putting in at least another trunk line to handle the volume of telephone business to Toronto and other points south.

Shareholders of West Dome Lake Gold Mines have been offered the right to subscribe to a block of 500,000 treasury shares of the company at 10 cents a share, according to an official announcement by Sir Henry Pellatt, president. A report of progress since the annual meeting, by Manager D. M. McPhail, says that work at the mine has been carried on energetically, and to as great an extent as the company's finances would allow. Exploration and development work has all been done on the 1,050 and 1,200-foot levels, the two deepest in the mine.

On the 1,200-foot level drifting was continued east to develop "C" ore shoot, which has a length now of 383 feet. The face is still in ore and this should continue for another hundred feet. On the 1,050-foot level drifting was carried east to a distance of 2,800 feet from the shaft, and considerable exploration carried on by crosscutting, short drifts and raises. In this easterly section a length of over 450 feet of low-grade ore was developed in three shoots. In places this ore is from 15 feet to 20 feet wide, and this section warrants a great deal more development.

In addition to this underground work the mill has recently been thoroughly overhauled and put in order to start any day.
