On January 21st, 1929, The Advance received from the department at Ottawa, a report of the Experimental Station at LaFerme, Que., for the years 1926 and 1927. If The Advance were a museum instead of an up-to-date newspaper, it would be exceedingly grateful to the department for this delightful little souvenir of times so long ago.
