Accounts were passed for payment, authority given for payment to public library, the usual grant of \$500.00 was made to the Children's Aid Society, and by-law passed for borrowing money until 1929 taxes began to come in.

A by-law was passed authorizing the paying of town councillors \$5.00 per day for each regular session during the year, as provided by the Municipal Act. A number of tax cases were adjusted.

Mr. Charette, now of Val Gagne, addressed the council in regard to damage to his property on Pine street, between Fifth and Sixth, from water that he said came from the road, but that some of the councillors thought was due to the low situation of his lot and house.

The arrests are a result of the investigation by the Attorney-General's Department into the affairs of the Jackson-Manion Company. Bail for Harcourt was set at \$10,000 in two securities of \$5,000 each; and for Thompson at \$5,000.

Harry E. Harcourt, mining engineer, is managing director of the Jackson-Manion Mines. A pioneer in Ontario mining activities, he is said to be the largest individual shareholder in the company.

David M. Thompson is the present manager of the company and was associated with Mr. Harcourt in its early days.

In addition to acting as managing director and mining engineer, Mr. Harcourt has been a member of the brokerage house of J. C. Ruse & Company. His dual capacity was criticized in the Attorney General department's report.
