When Tea Was An Expensive Luxury

Tea-drinking is now so universal a custom that it is hard to believe that at one time tea was an epicurean luxury, and sold at from ten to twenty-five shillings a pound. Nevertheless, as late as the mid-Victorian era a tea caddy filled with a pound of tea was a very handsome present.

It was the custom then to keep tea in handsome tea caddies. In a recent article in the "London Daily Express" sent to the Salada Tea Company, the following interesting account is given of the origin and importance of the tea caddy.

The old-fashioned tea caddy was invariably beautiful in its proportions and intimate in its associations. It is, moreover a rare thing today to find two tea caddies alike. The prettiest and most charming were made between 1775 and 1801. At first they were made of mahogany or of satinwood, inlaid with other choice woods, and sometimes painted with flowers or scrolls.

Besides these treasures, some were made of neatly-cut straw work, laid in geometrical patterns, over a wooden box, for such straw work was a hobby of the day. Some stand on little feet, some have a tiny handle on the lid, and all have dainty key holes.

The word "caddy" comes from a Chinese word, "catty," meaning a parcel of tea weighing about one pound and a third, for so the Chinese merchants were accustomed to make up their tea.
