## Schumacher C.G.I.T. Present Play in Very Attractive Way

Crowded houses upon both occasions greeted Mrs. McGee and her troop of Canadian Girls in Training in the presentation of their play, "Dearies," on Monday and Tuesday in the basement of the United Church. The scenery, costumes and other accessories had received capable attention, and the story was enacted with exceptional cleverness by every performer. The curtain rises upon a scene in the office of the Orphans' Home, presided over by the cruel matron, Deborah Maine, Barbara, Kate and Lena, the latter supposedly half-witted, are inmates of the institution. Kate determinedly plans immediate escape and at the same time the matron's beloved jewels mysteriously disappear. The next act introduces the wealthy Mrs. Chase, her daughter, Mrs. Langthorne, who is madly in love with Dick, the marriage meaning disinheritance for the former. Kate, who is now a maid with the Langthorne family, assists Sylvia to elope, but an accident in which Barbara is badly injured by the eloping couple's car, brings Barbara and Kate together at the Langthorne home. Barbara's true identity as granddaughter of Mrs. Chase is learned later by the discovery of a neck lace from the matron's jewel-case. The story later reveals that Kate is the daughter of Lena, who is disguised as a simple-minded person to obtain information regarding the Orphans' Home. Dick, disguised as twin sister of Mammy, the cook, gains admittance to the Langthorne household and presses his suit for the fair Sylvia. Further developments show that he is wealthy, and all opposition to the match is at an end. The play closes with scenes of peace and happiness. Mrs. McGee in the role of the cruel matron was a decided success. The difficult parts of the orphan girls were very cleverly presented by Misses Mary Macdonald, Kitty Duxfield and Marion Leng. The character of the dignified and stately Mrs. Chase was interpreted with great skill by Miss Beatrice

## LOCALS

Constable Byrne, of Toronto, has been added to the provincial police force at Cobalt, taking up his new duties last week.

Toronto board of trade is planning a visit to Sudbury around the middle of May. Other districts in northwestern Ontario may be visited, but this part of the North Land will not be included in the itinerary for this trip according to present plans.

The A.S.D. Club are giving a dance in the Masonic hall on Friday evening of this week, May 3rd, dancing to commence at 9:30 p.m., and music for the occasion to be furnished by Tommy Stephens and his popular orchestra. Social events by the A.S.D. Club are always enjoyable and to-morrow evening's affair promises to be up to the usual high standards.

The official opening of the new Children's Aid Shelter at Sudbury, which was scheduled for April 29th and 30th, has been postponed owing to a case of meningitis at the Shelter. Leo Boucher, 11 years of age, died at Sudbury Shelter some days ago from spinal meningitis, and as a consequence the building is quarantined, though no other cases have developed to date.

There are a few mild cases of small-pox in Sudbury and the surrounding district and Dr. W. J. Cook, M.H.O., advises all citizens who have not been vaccinated within the past seven years to apply to their family doctor for vaccination. Dr. Cook points out that there is no cause for any alarm, but suggests vaccination as an effective precaution against any spread of the disease.

On innumerable occasions The Advance has warned boys against playing with dynamite caps. Jim Scott, a fourteen-year-old Sudbury boy, is in St. Joseph's hospital, Sudbury, with four fingers blown off his right hand as the result of the explosion of a supposedly "dead" dynamite cap. He found the cap on the high school grounds and after carrying it for two weeks, he lit a match against it a week ago. He lost the four fingers of his right hand and also sustained minor cuts and bruises on the face and body.
