## SAID TO BE SEEKING FUNDS TO APPEAL IVANCHUK CASE

Fellow Countrymen Living at Kirkland Lake Reported to be Interested Now in Case of Ivanchuk.

Reports from Haileybury last week were to the effect that fellow countrymen of John Ivanchuk, the man condemned to death last month for the murder of Inspector Constable at Cochrane in October, 1926, were interesting themselves in plans to secure a new trial or to carry an appeal to the Appellate Division at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. In hearing these reports there will be natural wonder as to why these fellow countrymen did not make some move in behalf of Ivanchuk during the many months he was awaiting trial on the charge. Perhaps, they were interested but if so it was not generally known.

However with the convicted man sentenced to be hanged on June 21st of this year and with a limited time for appeal measures to be taken, it is understood that efforts are now under way to help Ivanchuk if such assistance can be given, and if the necessary finances can be gathered. Despatches last week from Haileybury say that "compatriots of the condemned man are said to be interested in the matter and, on good authority, it is learned that they have approached a well-known K.C. of Toronto to take up their case. Two men from Bukovina, now living in Kirkland Lake, are said to have been in Haileybury during the past few days in connection with the matter, and they also visited Cobalt, it is believed, where a number of fellow-countrymen reside. The plan is to raise a fund to finance an appeal, it is stated. According to one source of information, it is reported that some new evidence has been brought out, which presumably would be used as a ground for arguing for a new trial. Another report states that the plan, however is to appeal from the verdict of the jury. Matters have not yet reached the definite stage of engaging counsel, so far as is known, but developments may be anticipated at an early date. The condemned man is reported to be bearing up well in the district jail at Haileybury.

## EYESIGHT OF INJURED MINER LIKELY TO FURTHER IMPROVE

A despatch from Cobalt this week says that Arthur Hardy, who was badly injured about the face and eyes in the fatal blasting accident at the Keeley mine some time ago, when Oscar Provencher died later from his injuries, has returned to the North from the Toronto General Hospital, in which institution he had been a patient since the accident. He reports that, while the sight of his eyes is affected to some extent, he can see fairly well, and he expects, from the information given by the experts in Toronto, that his sight will be still further improved within a year. Hardy was rushed to Toronto as soon as possible after the accident.

## NEW UNITED CHURCH TO BE ERECTED AT ENGLEHART

A new building for the United Church is to be erected at Englehart on the same site as the present church. The new church will be a modern building, 60 feet by 32 feet, of stucco finish and with concrete basement. E. A. Rutledge, of North Bay, has been awarded the contract for the building which is to cost about \$12,000.00. Work will start in a few weeks.

At Haileybury jail a bowling green is being constructed, the work being done by men serving terms at the institution. The green when completed, however, is not for the pleasure of the compulsory inmates of the jail. There is no law compelling any men to play this game. Enthusiasts for bowling on the green will say no such law is necessary. The bowling greens at the Haileybury jail will be for officials of the court house, members of the Haileybury legal profession and others.

## ARREST OF THE COBALT MEN WITH THE SILVER VESTS

An incident in the North of the old days is recalled by a paragraph in the column in The North Bay Nugget headed "The North Country of Yesterday." This paragraph deals with the attempt to carry away a quantity of silver ore from Cobalt concealed in cleverly-constructed vests. The item from The Nugget files of April 27th, 1914, reads as follows:—

"A smart piece of work was pulled off on Saturday night, by the police when four Finlanders, Cobalt miners, were caught on the evening train, headed for Toronto, and wearing waistcoats loaded with silver ore. P.C. Sharp took off one of the gang at Cobalt and the others were taken in charge by P. C. Fred Lefebvre. The men were found to be in possession of approximately 200 pounds of ore, valued at \$1,800."

## M. BOVIN ERECTING TWO SAWMILLS NEAR RUTHERGLEN

The North Bay Nugget last week says:—"Mr. Matt Boivin, Timmins has been in the district during the past week supervising the construction of two sawmills in the vicinity of Rutherglen. He is building a stationary mill and a portable mill to manufacture lumber from timber to be taken from that area."

The Wawbewawa correspondent of The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—"A runaway which did not run very fast happened at Wabe one day last week, while the teamster was putting on the cream can. The team took fright when they noticed a lady in the train using a lipstick. Being raised on the farm they did not know what it was. ## NEW DISCOVERY MADE AT THE CENTRAL KAMISKOTIA

Major Barton Reports the Discovery of a New Vein South of the Original Dyke

Very favourable reports of work being done on the Kamiskotia property of the Central Kamiskotia Company in Godfrey Township, have been received by the officials of the company. Major H. G. Barton, in charge of operations, reports the discovery of a new vein to the south of the original dyke of chalcopryite, discovered last fall.

It is a quartz vein and carries much chalcopryite with bornite and azurite. The vein is continuous on surface for over 50 feet. Further exploration is being carried on in the same locality to the north and south of the mineralized zone.

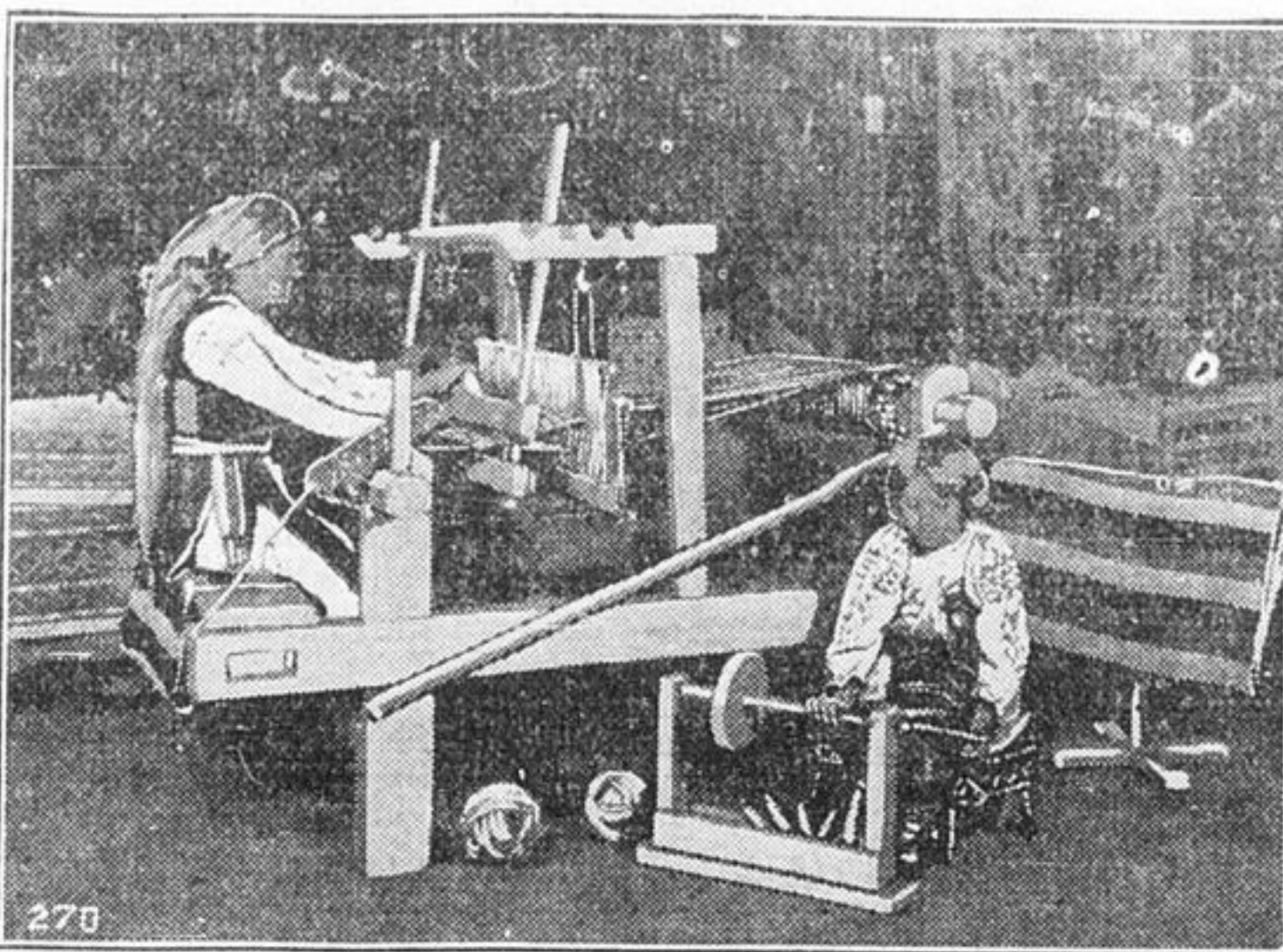
There are at present seven men at work on the property and work is being carried along in effective way. The results so far are most encouraging and justify the most hopeful outlook. The Central Kamiskotia Company expect to make a mine of their property and are working to that effect, following up each discovery made and planning for more extensive operations as conditions warrant.

## IMMIGRANT WOMEN LEFT TRAIN BUT WAS LOCATED

Some weeks ago a young woman coming to the Canadian West from Central Europe was apparently lost in transit. She was on the train all right when the National on which she was travelling was passing over the T. & N. O. south of Porquus Junction but when the train reached Cochrane there was no trace of the young woman. In the case of immigrants coming out to Canada the railways pay special attention to seeing that they reach their destination safely. This, probably applies particularly to women and children. Accordingly when the young lady "turned up missing," as the Irishman would say, there was some excitement and anxiety shown. The T. & N. O. at once notified the provincial police and a very thorough search was made. Eventually the young woman was located at Schumacher. It would appear that a fellow countryman, who boarded the train at Swastika, had brought the young woman along with him to Schumacher, the young woman being agreeable to thus changing her destination. As the young woman is of years of discretion and there was nothing improper about any part of the proceedings, the change in destination of this immigrant will not likely cause further action. Until the young woman was located, however, there was considerable anxiety to find her whereabouts and to make sure that no ill had befallen her, as the T. & N. O. has a natural rooted objection to losing passengers or other material being transported over its lines.

## Foundation of National Culture

Those who have in the past regarded the New Canadians from Europe as hewers of wood and drawers of water must, after the recent demonstrations at the Great West Festival at Regina, admit that these peoples have, with their native arts, decidedly enhanced the cultural wealth of the country of their adoption. J. Murray Gibbon, who sponsored the festival under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific Railway, even goes so far as to say that Saskatchewan and the other prairie provinces have within their borders the foundation of a National culture finer than that of any other nation on earth. To this foundation, the first sod for which had been turned at the previous festival at Winnipeg, all the races which go to make up the peoples of the west have contributed—Icelanders and Irish with their folk-songs and lore, Swedes and Slavs alike with their folk-crafts and dances. Hardly a race known to civilization, old or new, but contributed to the festival some artistry which will make for the further development of that culture which, being national, will be the means of welding to a still greater solidarity, those people who are Canada.

That the movement for the attainment of this end is a popular one was demonstrated by the fact that literally thousands were unable to obtain admission to the exhibits and concerts and that western cities are vying with one another as the site of the next festival.
