NEW POWER HOUSE UNDER CONSTRUCTION AT HAYDEN

Operations at the Hayden Gold Mines are reported to be fairly active. The property recently was visited by some of the officers of the company. A new power house is at present under construction. Some of the other buildings are being enlarged and improved in preparation for the summer's operations. The building programme is being carried out by W. E. Bezanon, contractor, of Timmins, and is making good progress.

COD LIVER OIL IMPORTANT IN CANADA'S FISH INDUSTRY

Upwards of 100,000 gallons of medicinal cod liver oil are yielded every year as a by-product of Canada's expanding sea fishery.

The oil owes its specific medical value to richness in vitamin content and, in a lesser degree, to its iodine value.

In 1925 the production of medicinal cod liver oil from the Canadian Fishery was only 26,836 gallons, but since then there has been a great increase. In 1926 the production was 94,383 gallons, and in 1927 slightly less than that—92,597 gallons. Figures for 1928 have not yet been completed and finally revised by the Fisheries Branch, but it is not expected that they will show any very material difference from those for 1927.

The Nova Scotia fishery is the largest producer of medicinal cod liver oil. Quebec was second in 1927, producing 22,640 gallons, valued at \$18,924, as compared with Nova Scotia's 57,264 gallon production valued at \$53,130. New Brunswick produced 12,489 gallons which were valued at \$12,226. British Columbia's production so far is small.

Cod oil, as distinct from medicinal cod liver oil, is another by-product of the fishing industry which adds \$90,000 or so to the annual fishery production, but oil obtained as a by-product of the British Columbia plichard fishery represents approximately ten times that figure.
