BABY NARROWLY ESCAPED SERIOUS INJURY TUESDAY

Baby Carriage Struck by Auto at Imperial Bank Corner. Child Thrown to Pavement, but Not Badly

On Tuesday afternoon about 1,25 there was an automobile accident at the corner of Pine street and Third avenue that created considerable excitement, a small baby being knocked escaping serious injury. The mother, for social events. Mrs. Martin, of 39 Preston street, was wheeling the baby cariage across the Pine street crossing. Mrs. E. Burnett drove her automobile down Third avenue from the station and was apparently going straight down, but made a quick turn towards Moneta and before Mrs. Martin saw the car it was upon her. It struck the baby carriage, throwing the baby out to the pavement. and smashing three wheels of the carriage. At first it was feared that the baby was badly injured or may be killed by the concussion. The youngster was picked up by Mr. W. D. Watt and hurried to Dr. Moore's where medical attention was given. Apparently the baby was badly injured or maybe killbeing rushed and some scratches and cuts being on its face. To avoid danger of more serious harm the baby was taken to the hospital where it remained until Wednesday afternoon. A. G. Slaght to Appear for Man Convicted of Murder of Inspector Constable in 1926.

Word from Toronto this week is to the effect that the appeal in the Ivanchuk case will be heard at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, by the Appelate Court at an early date, Wednesday next, June 5th being the date likely set for hearing of argument in the case.

The appeal will be heard by the First Divisional Court, presided over by Chief Justice Sir William Mulock. With the Chief Justice in the hearing will be associated Justices Middleton, Magee, Hodgins and Grant.

John Ivanchuk was convicted Cochrane in April of this year of the at Cochrane on October 15th, 1926. The inspector was shot from behind in cowardly fashion. Witnesses at the trial of Ivanchuk told of the accused having told them that he committed the crime, while one young woman swore that Ivanchuk had given her the Mauser revolver with which it was be lieved the murder was committed, telling her to keep it until he asked for it again. In his defence Ivanchuk nied even knowing the witnesses who gave the most damaging evidence against him. After a full trial in which Ivanchuk was very ably defended by his counsel, Harry Fine, of Ansonville, the accused was found guilty by the jury and Mr. Justice Wright sentenced Ivanchuk to be hanged on June
