### SOME CROP OF BURDOCKS ON THE FERGUSON HIGHWAY

The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—"On the Ferguson Highway, just a few hundred yards south of Moore's Cove, between Halleybury and New Liskeard, stands an example of the most flagrant disregard of the Ontario Government's Weed Control Act. At time of writing the roadside has a hedge of old burdock stalks which would do credit to any grower if the burdock was any kind of merchantable grain. Just who is responsible for allowing this disgraceful condition of affairs to exist we know not; but we hope that the hint is all that is necessary to have the nuisance removed from eyesight, at least before outside visitors begin to make extensive use of the highway. Ten minutes of the time of a man would have destroyed these burdock stalks before they had the opportunity of scattering millions of seeds around the ground."

### PLOT OF PICTURE BASED ON THE HAILEYBURY FIRE

"Talkie" Movie to be Produced in Timmings and District a Real North Land Feature

Many recent references have been made in The Advance to the motion picture film, "Breed of the Pioneer," to be produced in Timmings and district this summer. In view of the fact that it will be the first all-talking picture made in the British Empire as well as the first motion picture drama in this part of the North there is very general interest in "Breed of the Pioneer." Further, it may be noted that the author of the story on which the motion picture "talkie" will be based is a North Land writer of distinction, Leslie McFarlane, formerly of Halleybury. Mr. McFarlane has moved his family to Halleybury for the summer to be able to be here to assist in the production. In referring to the matter last week The Halleyburian said:—"Preliminary work on the motion picture production of 'The Breed of Pioneers,' film epic of the North Country, has already been started, according to Leslie McFarlane, author of the short story from which the picture is being made. While there are many details to be taken care of, more details than usual, as a matter of fact, because 'The Breed of Pioneers' is to be a talking picture, it is confidently expected that the film will go into production late in June or early in July. It will be the first all-talking picture produced in the British Empire."

"Mr. and Mrs. McFarlane and their infant daughter arrived in Halleybury on Monday from Toronto, where they spent a few days after their departure from Montreal. They are visiting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McFarlane, Marcella Street, and plan to take up residence here for the summer. Leslie has been retained by the company producing the picture to assist in an advisory capacity during the filming of his story.

"I'm particularly pleased that the first of my stories to be purchased for the motion pictures is a North Country yarn and that it will be produced in the North Country," he said. "It will probably interest Halleybury people to know that the story is really the tale of the Halleybury fire. As it appeared originally in MacLean's Magazine, I was obliged to alter my background considerably, for technical reasons, in order to play up my characters, but the descriptive passages and the general theme rise directly from the disaster. The plot has been elaborated somewhat for the picture version."

"It will be a 'talkie,' of course. Silent pictures are on the way out. I think the sound and dialogue effects will enable us to get a great deal more authentic Northern atmosphere into the picture than we could do otherwise. The fact that it will be the first all-dialogue and sound picture produced in the British Empire lends added interest."

"It is planned to film a number of scenes at Golden City while the major part of the location will be near Timmings, in the Kamiskotia area. There will be many 'extras' employed and all 'sets' will be made in Timmings. "While a number of motion picture companies have invaded the North Country in past years for the purpose of shooting scenes for various productions, 'The Breed of Pioneers' will be the North Country's own picture, a tribute to the builders of the Northland, conceived and written by a Northern Ontario author, and produced in the country which inspired the story."

"Although the story has been purchased outright for production, Mr. McFarlane has been engaged to write the dialogue and to work along with Mr. McCall, the director and producer, in selecting cast, locations, and generally checking up to ensure fidelity to the Northern background. Mr. McCall is very anxious to have a production that will be accurate in every detail and will probably be in Halleybury this week for a conference with the author. Practically the entire picture will be photographed in the North Country, although the lack of sound stages in Canada may make it necessary to take a few of the dialogue interiors in New York.

"George McCall, who will direct the picture, has directed many feature productions of Hollywood motion picture concerns and has earned an enviable reputation in this field, critics paying him special tribute for the artistry of his productions. Recently he has been with the Ontario Government Motion Picture Bureau. Having had both stage and motion picture experience, he is well equipped to turn out a picture that should rate highly from both dialogue and photographic standards. His aim is to make 'The Breed of Pioneers' a picture truly reflective of the North Country."

"The picture will be made under the British quota act which requires that 12 1/2 per cent of all pictures shown in Great Britain must be produced on British soil and by British talent. Under this quota act, pictures must be produced with 100 per cent British capital, 75 per cent British workmen, 75 per cent produced in British soil. Canadian capital is backing the film and more than the required 75 per cent of production will be in the North Country. The fact that the picture comes under the quota ensures its presentation field in the Old Country, and inasmuch as the supply of good talking pictures falls far short of the Canadian and American demand, leading distributors on this continent have already shown interest in the production.

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### FERGUSON HIGHWAY NEEDS SOME LITTLE FIXING UP NOW

The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—"During the latter part of last week the Ferguson Highway some thirteen or more miles north of New Liskeard was in very bad condition. Winter gravelling which does not appear to have been graded down, together with heavy driving and the apparent passing over that section of a tractor has played havoc with the road bed. Wherever the road was left last fall in a well-graded state the road is invariably in first-class shape. Travelers from the south say that with the exception of the section between Latchford and Cobalt, the road to Toronto is pretty good. In the section referred to gangs of men and teams are at work widening and improving the original "trail" which connected the lumbering centre with the silver camo."

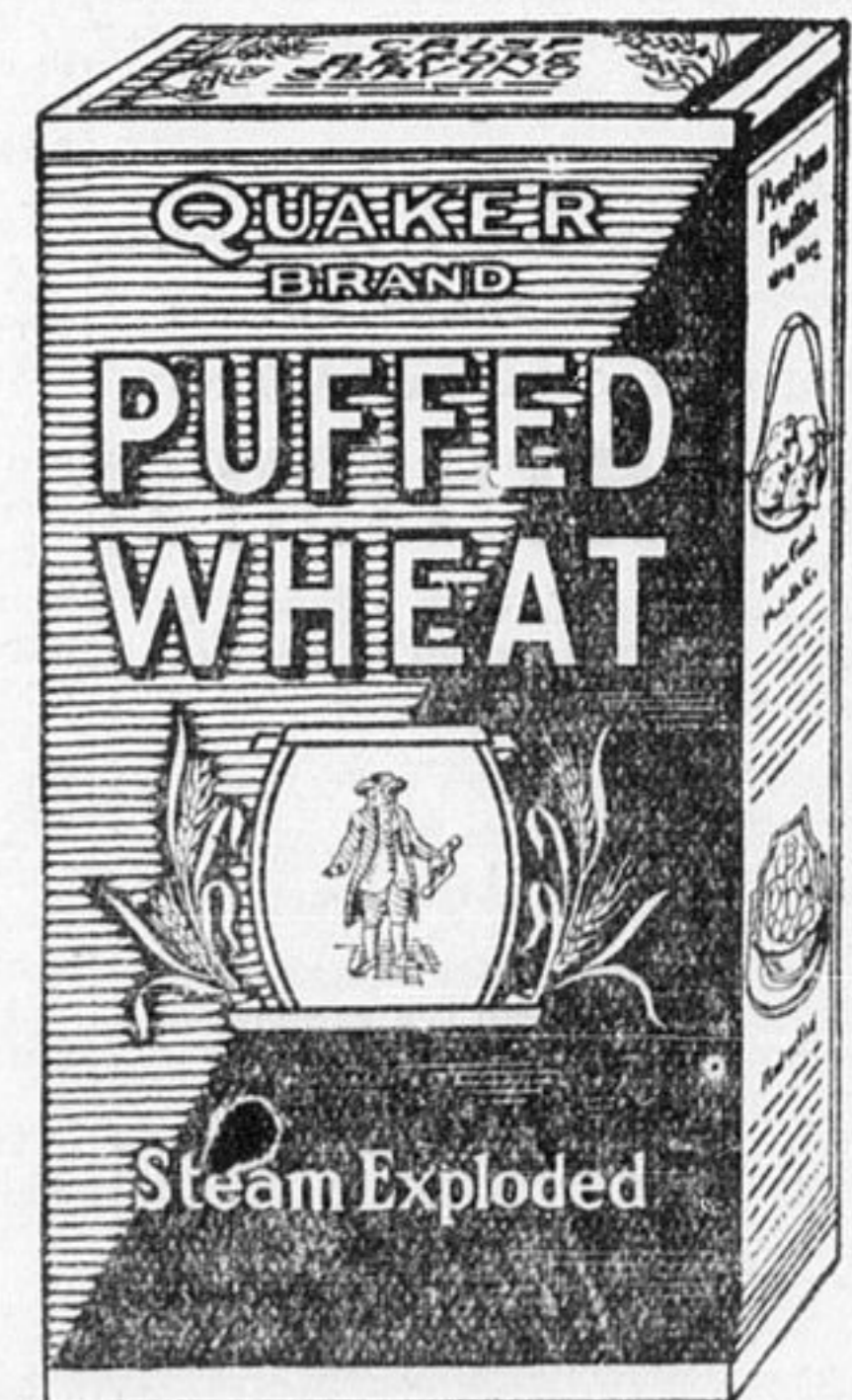
