Mickey Watts Wins on a Foul McGuire Knocked-out Taylor

Boxing Bouts on Monday Have Everybody Talking All Week. Cornish Wrestlers Please Audience. Kid Hamilton and Lefty Billy Trumble Get Crowd on Toes. Morris-Rowan Bout one of Best Seen in Years.

Billed to start at 9.00 p.m. on Friday, the 2nd instant, "Lap" LaPrairie's Cornish wrestling and boxing exhibition started with the wrestlers being introduced at 8.59 p.m., and the light-weights in their first hitch at 9.00 p.m. M. Trudgeon won first and third back from W. Hooper, the acknowledged champion, in the best two out of three. All three backs were clean falls and made on intricate hitches. Stan Hooper retains the middle-weight title in a sudden death, when he threw W. Brewer after a 20-minute hitch.

The wrestling mats were removed from the ring and the boxing exhibition started with Harold Wallingford and Freddie Godin giving a three two-minute round, no decision, exhibition. Next came the surprise of the evening when "Kid" Roy Hamilton and "Lefty" Billy Trumble mixed it up, high, wide and handsome, for a 4-round no decision, bout. Trumble at 110 pounds gave away 6 pounds to the "Kid," who scaled 116 pounds. While Trumble is no stranger in the ring in Timmins, it was the "Kid's" first appearance in the resined canvas here and for all the difference it made in his action he might as well have been up a back alley as he was right at Trumble from the first gong till the last. In the case of a decision, Trumble, the ex-British Boy Scout champion, would have had a slight advantage in points, but he claims the "Kid" is there with the goods and has all that goes to making a real fighter.

"Frenchy" Leonard Morris and "Bobby" Rowan, the little Scot, next went four two-minute rounds to a judge's decision of a draw. With Morris at 128 pounds and Rowan at 132 pounds, they put in a bout that was in itself worth the price of admission. These boys don't clinch, foul or stall. They box every second of their round and show what every fight fan loves, and that is science, backbone and sportsmanship.

"Handsome" Pat McGuire and the 18-year-old cowboy, George Taylor, next went 4 rounds. Taylor just about closed up both of Pat's eyes in the first three rounds, but in the fourth round, Pat picked one up from about a foot underneath the floor of the ring, or had a brick hid in his glove, for without any other warning but a slight squeal he scored a knockout when he shot a fast right, from his inside left ankle to Taylor's chin and the cowboy took the count of ten.

Next came the feature bout of the evening. Mickey Watts, the little fighting Welshman entered the ring to the Welsh air, "Men of Harlech," played to perfection by the Timmins Citizens' Band. Next came "Dutch" Henry Johnson, Timmins' own boy, to the tune of "O, Canada." Referee Arthur Leonard introduced the boys, gave them their instructions and warnings, bandages were examined and the principals repaired to their corners. From the first clang of the gong, Watts and Johnson showed that they were finished artists in both fist science and ring generalship. Johnson seemed to be the aggressor but points were evenly distributed. Very unfortunately Johnson unintentionally fouled Watts, after

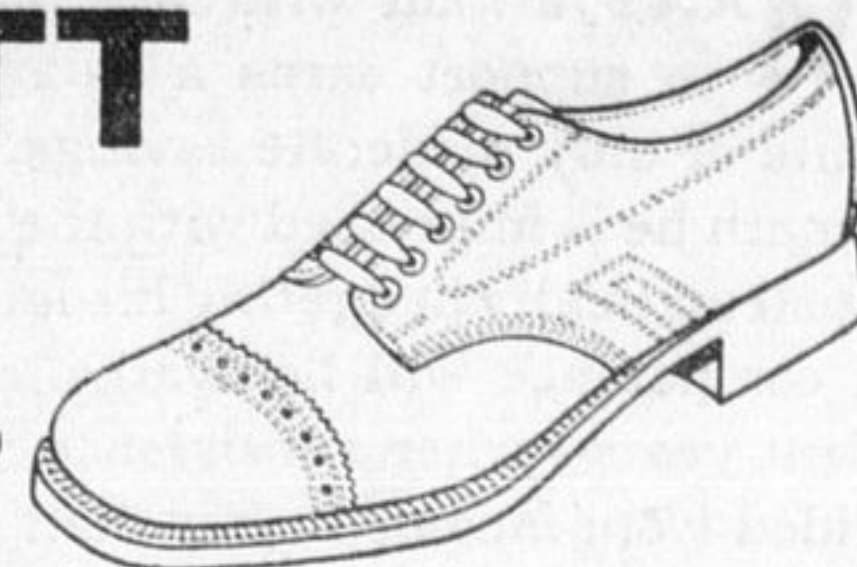
Motion Picture Film, "Overweight," Excellent

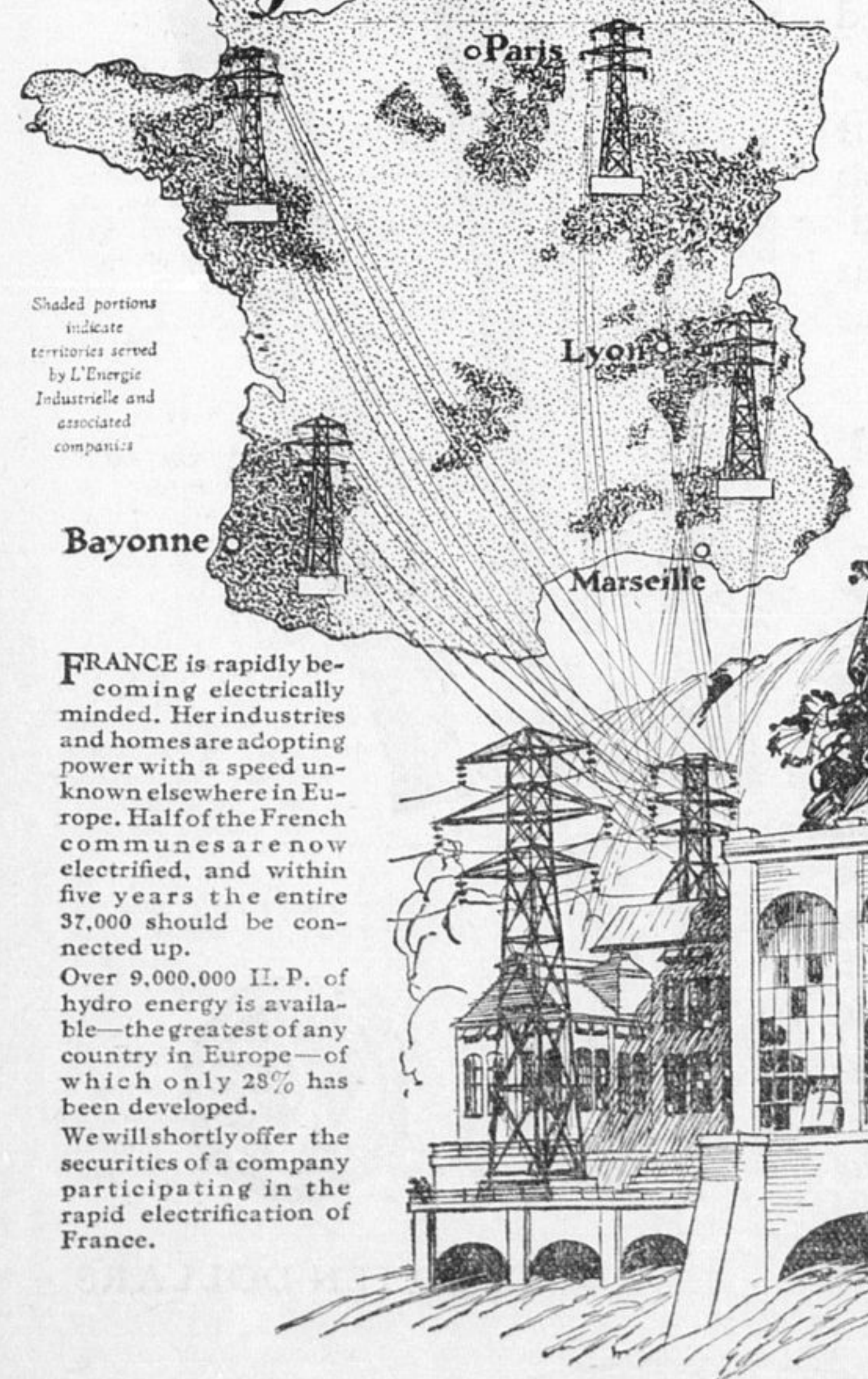

RIDGEDOME MINES APPOINT C.J.B. ARMSTRONG MANAGER

Campaign of Development Work Planned for Present on Property South of the Hayden.

Mr. C. J. B. Armstrong, mining engineer, formerly of Cobalt and popularly known as "Army" Armstrong amongst his confreres and many friends in the North Country has been appointed resident engineer of Ridgedome Mines with headquarters at Timmins, Ont.

Mr. Armstrong, it will be remembered was General Superintendent of the Northern Customs Concentrator at Cobalt and flotation expert for the General Engineering Company. He was also superintendent of Kirkland Lake in the early days, and the latter four years with the Hollinger Mine.

Mr. Armstrong has taken over his new duties at the property and is erecting shaft head and installing plant and equipment to sink No. 1 shaft to depth.

The installation of plant should be completed within the next 30 days, when active development of the property will be aggressively carried on.

It is the intention of the management to sink to 500 feet this year and start cutting and drifting at several levels. An active diamond drilling campaign will also be carried on.

This new development work undertaken by Ridgedome Mines coupled with the successful diamond drilling results obtained by the Hayden Mine on their adjoining property and the plans of that company for the aggressive development of their property has aroused great interest in that section of Porcupine Camp in which these properties are located.

Sam Kalemer is staging another boxing exhibition at Kirkland Lake on June 14th. Among the bouts noted as to be held will be—Kid Williams and E. O. Stevens, of Toronto; Dutch Johnson versus another classy boxer, to be arranged.
