

# Death of Mr. Angus Sinclair At Schumacher on Tuesday

### Respected Schumacher Citizen Passes Away Suddenly. Anniversary of Schumacher United Church Sunday School Held on Sunday, June 2nd. Other Items of Interest from The Advance Correspondent at Schumacher

Schumacher, Ont., June 5th, 1929. Special to The Advance.  
After several months' illness, Mr. Angus Sinclair, one of our highly-esteemed citizens passed peacefully away on Tuesday morning. Stricken by a paralytic stroke on Thursday he remained unconscious to the end. The late Mr. Sinclair was sixty-six years of age, a blacksmith by trade and had resided with his family in Schumacher for about five years, coming here from the scene of his earlier manhood, Halifax County, Nova Scotia. Mrs. Sinclair, wife of deceased, died very suddenly two years ago last September. The surviving members of the family are three daughters—Mrs. Fred Redmond, Newcomb's Corners, Nova Scotia; Mrs. Arthur Olson, Vipond Mine; and Miss Ada Sinclair, Schumacher. Mr. Abner Sinclair, the only son, resides at home. Two brothers survive, one in Vancouver, B.C., and the other in Port Dufferin, N.S. The funeral service, very largely attended and conducted by Rev. Morley Hall, Timmings, was held on Wednesday at

two o'clock, in the Trinity United Church. Beautiful floral tributes in profusion spoke eloquently of love and respect. The pall-bearers were Messrs Harry Leng, Dan Isnor, Wm. Isnor, Jos. White, Robert Brown and Austin Fraser. The remains were interred in the cemetery at Timmings. Among the floral tributes were:—Harp, from the family; cross, from Mr. and Mrs. A. 
