Mr. Ferguson can give, any such plans would find the firmest support in the south. * * * *

It is not too much to say that \$4,000 is high for the average ability of the members of the House of Commons, when measured alongside the rates of wages paid to other professional men. The Government is to be complimented for taking a firm stand in the matter of opposing an increase in the salaries of the members without the opinion of the people being known in the matter. It does not seem like good sportsmanship that the members who can quarre so fiercely over matters concerning the vital interests of the people should find it so easy to agree to increase their own pay.
